He will leave here about the middle of February for New York where he will reside. Mr. Livingston is retiring from the consular service. He was appointed to the Charlottetown post in July, 1920 and arrived here in September of that year.

NAVIGATION COURSE OPENED.—The Navy League School of Navigation opened for the season yesterday in the Navy League building. Preparations have been made to receive a large class this year and under the efficient direction of Commander Lewis there is no doubt but that the pupils taking the course will receive very efficient training in nautical science. The wireless class under the tutelage of Mr. Walter Hyndman is progressing rapidly and an increasing interest is being manifested by the pupils in their studies.

CANADA FUR FARMS.—In a review of fur market conditions the Philadelphia Public Ledger states that there are 306 fox fur farms on Prince Edward Island—more than half of Canada's total number. Nova Scotia has 52 fox farms, New Brunswick 57, Quebec 76, Ontario 40, the Prairie provinces 18, and British Columbia and the Yukon 24.

SIGNAL COURSE STARTING.—Sgt. D. H. Kemplin, of Halifax, instructor in signalling, is in the city and will take over a local class this afternoon at the drill shed for a six-weeks course in signalling. Major F. M. Jones, D.S.O., Signal Officer and Col. W. H. Carter, Inspector, are expected by Sgt. Kemplin to arrive from Halifax on the late train last night. Sgt. Kemplin is registered at The Revere.

COMMISSIONER'S MEETING POSTPONED.—The first meeting of the new members of the Provincial Commission which was to be held in the secretary's office, Charlottetown, yesterday, was postponed until Monday next owing to the stormy weather which prevented the arrival of the train from Montreal. It is rumored that some change is likely to be made in the staff of liquor inspectors at the meeting of the Commission next week. The appointment of the new commissioners dates from January 3rd.

HEAVY TRACK EAST.—Reports last night indicate that the railway track is still heavy with snow in the eastern part of the Island. The train which left Charlottetown for Souris on Monday remains stalled between St. Peter's Bay and Bear River, in the western section of the track. It is now clear, the Borden train leaving Charlottetown yesterday morning arrived at its destination at 4 p. m. and the afternoon Summerside train arrived in the city at 6.30 p. m. Yesterday the trains did not leave Georgetown or Murray Harbor. The storm blocked the country roads yesterday in many places. The mail train last night was delayed until near midnight.

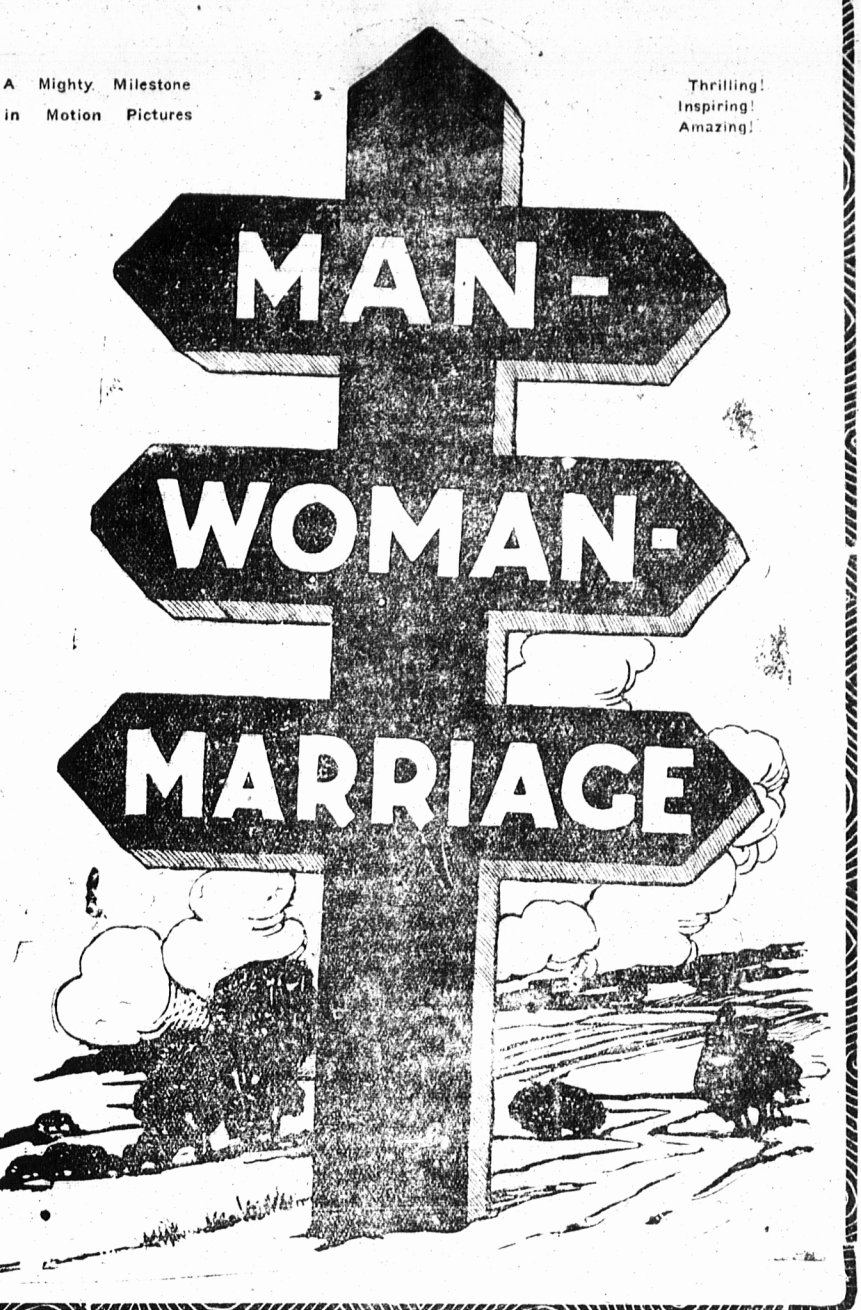
