DENMARK HOLDS UP A COTTON SHIP.— LONDON, Feb. 8.—The Danish authorities have forbidden the steamship Navahoe to proceed from Esbjerg to Bremen with her cargo of cotton, owing to the prohibition against the exportation of cotton from Denmark, says the Copenhagen correspondent of The Daily Mail. The damage which the Navahoe sustained when she went aground is being repaired.

FOUND BEAR CUB.— On Friday, Feb. 6th, while Mr. John W. Birt was chopping in the woods, he made a very unusual discovery. Seeing a rather large hole in a hollow tree near by, he thought he would investigate. All indications led to the conclusion that the hollow tree was occupied by some sort of denizen of the forest—perhaps a black fox. Accordingly, he sent his son home for the gun while he stood guard at the tree. Soon the boy returned with the gun and Mr. Birt thrust the barrel up the hollow tree as far as possible and fired. Somewhat to his surprise, no doubt, down tumbled a black mass which Mr. Birt, at first sight, took to be a black fox, "de-fatted" by the charge fired as such close range; but on taking the second look, he saw it was no less than Master Bruin—a six-month old cub. OF LOCAL INTEREST.— Rev. J. G. McIvor, D. D., has been called to the congregation of Gravel Hill and Monklands (Ont.), in the Presbytery of Glenarry. Dr. McIvor held a pastorate in Clyde River, P. E. I., for several years, and later in Okotoks, Alberta, from which charge he resigned in 1913 for the sake of his health. He spent a few weeks in St. John last winter, several congregations in the city and vicinity having heard his sermons with satisfaction and profit.

ISLANDER KILLED.— A particularly sad accident occurred in Butte Cy, Montana, on Jan. 27th when Martin W. eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. D. A. Martin was returning from school in trying to get on the car which he was riding on the wheels. He was immediately taken to the Murray Hospital where it was discovered that his injuries were very great, one leg being cut off below the knee and the other terribly mutilated. All was done for him that medical science could do but he passed away four hours later in his father's arms. The boy was seven years old and was beloved by all. Much sympathy is extended to Mr. and Mrs. Martin in their sad bereavement. Mr. D. A. Martin formerly belonged to Bell River and is a son of the late Martin Martin.

THE MODERATOR AND BELGIAN RELIEF.— Rev. W. T. Herridge D. D., moderator of the General Assembly, who is well known in Charlottetown, has issued an appeal to the church for continued generosity in the matter of relief for the suffering Belgians in the course of his appeal he says: "I am sure that Presbyterians throughout Canada have not been slow in contributing to the Belgian Relief Fund. For this reason, and also because it seems preferable that we should give as citizens rather than as members of any church, I have not thought it wise to appoint a special Sunday for such an offering. At the same time I wish to call attention to the need for continued aid. I hope adherents of the Presbyterian church in Canada, either through local organizations already engaged in this work, or in such other way as may seem best, will preserve their efforts to assist the sorrowing Belgians, and those people whose splendid stand against oppression is the most heroic event of modern history."

MORE ISLAND NURSES.— Among the Canadian nurses leaving for the front are two Prince Edward Island girls, the Red sisters, Miss Mary Florence, and Miss Janet, daughters of the late Wallace L. Rodd, of Brackley Point. The former is a graduate of the Prince Edward Island Hospital, and has been engaged in nursing in the West for the past few years, having recently been located in Calgary. The Calgary Herald has an extended report of the departure of Miss Rodd and another nurse, Miss Mallory, for the front. Here is an extract from the Herald article:—"Interviewed by the Herald yesterday afternoon, both ladies expressed deep satisfaction on having been selected. They are both highly trained and fully experienced nursing sisters and have done much private nursing in this city and both being very well known and highly respected. Both are Canadian born and by a strange coincidence both are from the Maritime Provinces. Nurse Mary Florence Rodd is a native of Prince Edward Island, having been born near Charlottetown. She came west five years ago after having graduated and nursed privately in the east. She nursed privately at Vancouver and Seattle before coming to Calgary two years ago and has nursed privately here since. Before leaving for England she hopes to be able to visit a brother at Ottawa and a sister at Montreal. Her brother, Robert, was a member of an order on the platform last night. "I know it is going to be hard work all the time," she said, "but that is what I want. I simply want to know and feel that I am doing something for the country. Oh, yes, it will be an ordeal all right, but it must be desirable in military hospitals. Like most of her sisters from the Island, she is tall with a carriage and bright eyes, which speak of a great strength of character. Her sister, Miss Janet, who also leaves for the front, has been nursing in Montreal.

GERMAN SHIP OF STATE ON ITS BEAM ENDS.— LONDON, Feb. 8.—The Daily Telegraph in an editorial considers Germany's declaration of the waters around Great Britain and Ireland and the coast of France and The Netherlands as naval war zones as proof of the economical pressure the British fleet is exercising and that the "German ship of state is on its beam ends."

"We could, of course," says the Daily Telegraph, "make reprisals, for we possess twice as many under water craft as Germany, but we could not descend to such a depth of infamy. The German proclamation consists of empty words, but it is self-revealing and Germany must be punished for this threat of frightfulness. We are convinced that any action in this direction the British Government for, and on behalf of the Allies, may take, will receive the support of the civilized world."

AUSTRIAN LOSSES TEN THOUSAND IN FIVE DAYS.— ROME, Feb. 7.—(Dispatch to the London Daily News) According to uncensored news from Budapest during the last five days of fighting in the Carpathians, the Austrian losses exceeded ten thousand.

Owing to the severe cold and lack of food, men are dying from exhaustion. The hospitals are crowded with frost-bitten soldiers.

The Russians have resumed the offensive on the Donajec, and occupied important positions in the Beskids, where it is expected they will be sufficiently reinforced shortly. A private Russian future plan consists of the invasion of Moravia across Hungary instead of through Silesia.

Austro-German efforts on the Carpathians, says a Petrograd dispatch to the Mail, are meeting with no better success than Austria's earlier attempts.

"The troops of the Dual Monarchy," sufficient suitable artillery for such continues the dispatch, "are neither numerous enough nor provided with a difficult task in the depth of winter. The fighting has ranged over 80 miles of front and the Austrians have been repulsed at almost every point. Their main attack in the region of the Uzsoz Pass and Beskid

THREE CONSPIRATORS PAID DEATH PENALTY. AMSTERDAM, Feb. 7.—(via London, Feb. 4.)—A Berlin despatch received here says that the execution of three of the conspirators in the assassination of the Archduke Francis Ferdinand, took place on Wednesday in the prison of the court fortress in Sarajevo, Bosnia. The men put to death were Voljko Ciburilovic, Micko Jovanovic and Daneilo Ilic. Two others, traitors, were sentenced to death were Jakov Zilovic and Nedjo Kerovic. Their sentences were later commuted to imprisonment for life and for twenty years respectively.

SOLDIER CHARGED WITH ASSAULT REMANDED. HALIFAX, Feb. 6.—The R. C. R. soldier, Ray Crossman, charged with wounding Mrs. Church near the head of the N. W. Arm, with intent to disable her, was arraigned before Stipendiary Magistrate yesterday. He is an able looking young man and said he was 20 years of age, belonged to Moncton and was single and temperate. He asked a continuance in order to retain counsel and was remanded until Wednesday. Mrs. Church was not in attendance, being unable to leave the house, but Detective Hanrahan had a witness ready in person of a young girl who was on the Arm road about the time of the assault and saw a soldier, whom she thought she could identify and who was accompanied by a dog, as was Mrs. Church's assailant.
