SCHOOLBOY GETS VERDICT OF \$100

DEDHAM, Jan. 28.—A verdict of \$100 was returned at 3.15 this afternoon in favor of James J. Hardiman, father of James Hardiman, Jr., in his suit against Frank C. Heald, principal of Ames Grammar School of this town for alleged cruel punishment to the boy.

The teacher testified: "I took the boy by the collar and trousers and laid him over a desk. I did not hurt him. I did not intend to hurt him. I should have left him in that position for about half an hour, but I forgave him."

The janitor testified earlier in the case that, entering the room to sweep on the afternoon of Feb. 9, he found the boy unconscious on the desk. She had plowed through the snow for about an hour when she saw two men standing on a corner and ordered them to move on. They didn't, so on her next round she drew her husband's revolver, and ordered them to march in front of her to the lockup. They did. When she reached the big door she opened it with her husband's key, shoved the men in and locked the gate.

Back she went to the beat and began to think of the plea of one of the men, who said he had a wife and three children in Manhattan. She thought about it so much that when his "trick" was up at midnight she went to the lockup, told the man with the family he could go, and when his companion said he did not like to spend the night alone, she said both could go. Then she went home.

A TRAINLOAD OF LIVING SKELETONS.

Canadian Business Man Describes Shocking Sight on the Belgian Frontier and Tells of Relief Commission's Work.

MONTREAL, Jan. 28.—Mr. Herbert Hoover, the man who has done such remarkable work in organizing and administering relief in Belgium, has sent a special message of thanks to Canada for the generosity with which the people of the Dominion have contributed to the support of the Belgian Relief Commission.

This is the news brought back to Canada by Mr. H. Biermans, general manager of the Belgo-Canadian Pulp and Paper Company of Shawinigan Falls, who, during his stay in Europe, has had an opportunity of personally observing the work of the commission.

Mr. Biermans, who is a member of the Central Belgian Relief Committee in Montreal, states that he visited the offices of the Belgian Relief Commission in both London and Rotterdam, and had interviews with Mr. Hoover regarding his work. Mr. Hoover, he says, spoke with delight of what Canada has done in helping the Commission, remarking that Canada was deserving of more gratitude in proportion than any other country, for she had contributed in proportion to her population a larger amount to saving the people of Belgium from starvation.

Mr. Biermans is full of admiration for the system under which the Belgian relief is worked. "The whole thing," he said, "is organized like some big industrial concern, and is run with an efficiency and economy that is beyond all praise."

Mr. Hoover, he said, had just completed the organization of a special system of relief for the children of Belgium, who were suffering terribly from privations. So great is the food shortage, despite all the efforts of the Commission, that thousands upon thousands of children were underfed and actually on the verge of collapse from starvation. Unless extraordinary efforts were made, he was convinced that at least one in every ten children in Belgium would die from sheer want. Mr. Hoover had found that it did not meet the

came to distribute food to families, as sometimes some children were favored at the expense of others. Where parents, for instance, were looking after orphan children as well as their own, they would favor their own children with food—an indication to Canadians of the terrible shortage existing. Mr. Hoover had, therefore, established children's kitchens all over Belgium, and had the children brought to those places every day to be fed under the actual supervision of officials of the Relief Commission.

Mr. Biermans thought it prudent not to seek to enter Belgium, but during his stay in Holland he was often at Rosendale, on the border, and there he had an opportunity of seeing for himself the condition of Belgian children. The German Government had been induced to allow Belgian children to be sent to Holland in trainloads for two weeks' recuperation at Dutch religious institutions. He was present at the station when one batch of these children arrived. He declares that he never saw such a pitiable sight in all his life. These children were emaciated to a shocking degree. They had staring frightened eyes, gaunt faces, their bones were almost sticking through their skin, and their forms were bowed as if with old age. The pathos of this sight was such that there was not a soul in the station who did not weep at the sight of this whole trainload of little living skeletons. Even the station agent, a big, burly fellow, went about his duties with the ears running down his face.
