FOREIGNERS ARE LEAVING THE U.S FOR EUROPE

Steamers Leaving Boston and New York Cannot Handle the Crowds

NEW YORK, Nov. 23—The rush of foreign laborers back to their homes in Europe, which began in such noticeable volume about three weeks ago, has reached such proportions that the steamship companies at this and other ports are in serious trouble to provide accommodation for the home-going.

Hundreds who wanted to sail yesterday were unable to find berths, and many who wished to sail tomorrow will have to wait for next Wednesday's steamers.

This week all the big transatlantic lines raised the steerage rate from \$21 to \$33, but this has not had a particle of effect on the demand for tickets.

A representative of the steerage department of the Hamburg-America line said today that 25,000 foreigners in this country were now leaving this port alone every week for Europe, and that there was not a sign anywhere of a letup in the tide of traffic.

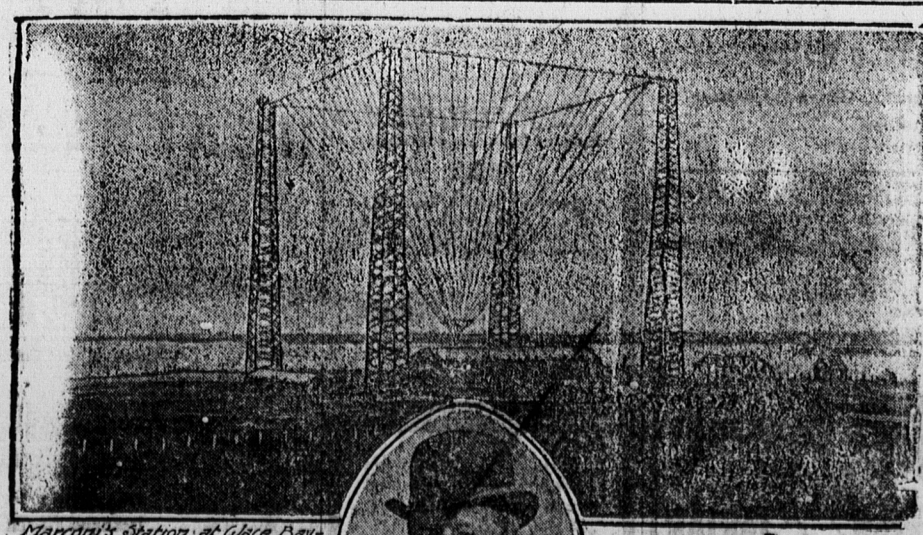
