## Pitching Is Made In American League Now

 CHICAGO, April 29 (AP)—That strange silence muffling American League bats—13 team shut-outs and almost a score of low-hit games in the two-week-old campaign—may mean that the stoke is on the other foot in the junior circuit.

Pitching instead of devastating hitting power is the mode of the moment in the American loop, long noted for its explosive clubbing.

You'd expect such workmen as Bobby Feller, Hal Newhouser and Tex Hughson to make things unpleasant for rival hitters, but the mastery goes much farther than that. Matching Feller's two shut-outs on a one-hitter and a three-hitter for instance, you have the two pitchers administered by Alie Reynolds of New York Yankees.

Chicago White Sox, figured for a second-division finish, have turned in three shut-outs, 39-year-old Thornton Lee registering one with a two-hitter. Ed Lopat, best pitcher in a season opener, scattered six hits for a 2-0 blanking of the Tribe.

Cleveland and Detroit also have counted three shut-outs. In all there have been 18 games in which five hits or fewer were allowed, including Feller's one-hitter, a trio of two-hitters, six three-hitters, three four-hitters and five five-hitters.

## Athletics Defeat Cleveland 4-3

 The lowly Philadelphia Athletics smote the proud Cleveland Indians 4-3 and Detroit Tigers humbled Boston Red Sox 8-3 behind a four-hit pitching job in the only games yesterday in the American League.

Two other scheduled encounters were rained out.

Virgil Trucks and Hal White combined at Detroit to hold last year's league winners to four softies, all by rookie third baseman Frank Shofner and Dom DiMaggio. DiMag's two blows drove in a pair of runs, however.

Tex Hughson, who gave up nine hits and walked five men in seven innings, was the losing ahead 6-2 when Boston loaded the bases in the eighth, and White took over to save Virgil's second victory.

Eddie Lake, with a pair of singles and a triple, and Dick Wakefield and Hoot Evers, with two blows each, paced the Bengal attack.

Gonnie Mack's men made a Cleveland crowd unhappy as they scored a gift run in the ninth for a win, after knotting the score with a run in the eighth. Don Black on the Indian mound walked Ferris Pain with the bases loaded in the top of the ninth to drop Cleveland into a fourth-inning tie with Washington.

Hal Peck of Indians and Hank Majeski of A's homered.



## Brooklyn Tightens Hold On National League Lead; Clout Chicago Cubs 10-6

 The Bums from Brooklyn tightened their hold on the National League top rung yesterday as they clouted Chicago Cubs for a 10-6 win, but the desperate St. Louis Cards fell still further: from last year's world championship status. New York Giants downed them 7-2 and pushed the Red Birds into sole occupancy of the cellar.

Hank Greenberg's third homer of the season gave Pittsburgh Pirates a 6-2 win over Philadelphia Phillies and Boston Braves blanked Cincinnati Reds 4-0 in the rest of the day's proceedings.

Dodgers' win was their sixth in a row and their eighth without a loss at Ebbets Field. Manager Burt Shotton's Frisky crew sewed up the game in the eighth when they sailed into Fajal Erickson, third base hurler, for seven runs on five hits. Dixie Walker's three-run double, Carl Furillo's two-run homer and Eddie Stanky's two-run double were the big blows for Dodgers. Peanuts Lowrey clouted a homer for the Cubs.

Johnny Mize, a former Card, belted his seventh homer of the season at New York as the Giants snapped a five-game losing streak and made it six losses for the Red Birds. Mize started Giants to victory by smashing one of Howie Pollet's southpaw slants deep into right field in the third with two mates on base.

Monte Kennedy went the route for Giants, yielding seven hits including Whitey Kurowski's homer. Greenberg, whose big bat hasn't been so potent so far, clouted his roundtripper with two men out and one aboard in the third inning to score runs number three and four—just enough to win as it turned out. Ralph Kiner hit his first homer a minute or so later after Frankie Gustine had singled.

Ed Bearss won his second game of the season as he scattered eight hits.

At Boston, lefty Warren Spahn gave up but four singles to win his number two, which also was the first whitewashing of the season by a Boston twirler.

Braves got three of their runs off starter Joe Beggs of the Reds and another off reliever Ed Bearss in the eighth.

## Boxing Quarrel Flares In Ontario

TORONTO, April 28—Even though John (Deacon) Allen smuggled in a "mouthpiece" and R. J. Somers drew up a 17-page constitution on behalf of the Athletic Union of Canada, pugilists signed with the Deacon's Amateur Boxing Association remain ineligible for the forthcoming championships at Port Arthur and subsequent bids in the 1948 Olympics.

Somers, secretary of the Central Ontario Branch of the A.A.U., sought to form an Ontario Amateur Boxing Association at the meeting Saturday. He had 17 pages of single-spaced, typewritten sheets of (proposed) constitution and by-laws of the O.A.B.A. The constitution was not discussed.

Said the Deacon: "My organization of 15 amateur boxing clubs throughout the Province has been known as the O.A.B.A. for about two years. In 1937 the Central Ontario Branch went to the Ontario Athletic Commission for assistance in supervision of boxing. The O.A.C. agreed and boxing flourished; now the A.A.U. wants to regain control after we have built the game up."

In every other Province but Ontario, amateur boxing is controlled by the Athletic Union of Canada branches.

Somers said boxing in shows operated by the Deke's O.A.B.A. were not recognized by the A.A.U. and, therefore, Toronto boxers would not be eligible for the A.A.U. championships which decide Canada's representatives in the Olympics.

## Defeat Royals 2-1 In Upset Victory

MONTREAL, April 29 (CP)—Calgary Stampeders, rebounding smartly from their opening game defeat, edged Montreal Royals 2-1 tonight in a nip-and-tuck game to even the best-of-seven Allan Cup final series at one game apiece.

The hard-pumping and hard-fighting western Canada color-bearers matched Royals in speed and checking for two periods and won the game on Duce Grant's goal at 14:30 of the third frame.

Previously in this second game of the final series for the Dominion senior amateur hockey title, Bunny Dome had scored for Calgary and Cliff Malone for the Montrealers, both in the second session.

The teams threw their weight around freely but the game was remarkably clean with only one 10-minute misconduct being handed out along with two minor penalties. The misconduct went to Casavant of Montreal for arguing with referee Levee Linden, who handled the match with referee Ken Holmestaw.

Royals outshot Calgary 31 to 15, but the red-shirted westerners had as many scoring chances as the easterners and fully deserved their victory.

The teams play the third game here Thursday night and then move back to Maple Leaf Gardens at Toronto for the next three games, with a seventh, if necessary, scheduled for Montreal.

## N.Y. Rangers To Change Fall Training Site

NEW YORK, April 28 (CP)—New York Rangers will break a 13-year-old tradition next fall when they train at Lake Placid, N.Y., instead of Winnipeg.

Manager Frank Boucher told the New York Hockey Writers' Association at a luncheon here today that the Rangers will continue to hold their annual school in Winnipeg. This year the school was held in the spring rather than the fall and Boucher said this policy will be continued.

Boucher, just back from the Winnipeg school, said it has been highly successful and that Rangers now have rights to 92 players for their three teams—Rangers of the National League, New Haven Ramblers of the American League and New York Rovers of the Eastern United States League.

He said two players who attended the school "may make the Rangers in 1947-48"—defenceman Bill Gloska and right wing Dunc Fisher, both of whom played with Regina Pats Juniors last year.

Both are natives of Regina. Fisher won an award last season as the outstanding player in Saskatchewan.

Boucher said the decision to train at Lake Placid was made because of its proximity to New York. Pre-season exhibition games probably will be played in Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto in addition to Lake Placid.

## 17-year-old Golfer Is Eliminated

GANTON, Yorks, Eng., April 28—Arthur Perowne, 11-year-old boy golfer, was eliminated in the first round of the English amateur golf championships today but other potential members of the British Walker Cup team stood the test of the 6,446-yard windswept course.

Perowne, one of 25 players invited to final trials for the Walker cup team next month, was defeated, 5 and 4, by Eric Piddian, a former champion. Impressive victory was by Gerald Micklem, a front-liner since he eliminated American ace Frank Stranahan in the British amateur tournament last May. With an outgoing 38, Micklem defeated Eric Chambers, 6 and 5.

Other candidates for the Walker cup team, which meets the United States May 16 and 17, were left-hander Percy Lucas, Frank Pennin, defending champion Ian Patey and Kenneth Thoms.

## Swim Records Approved By Association

WINNIPEG, April 27 (CP)—The 38th annual meeting of the Canadian Amateur Swimming Association, attended by delegates from Quebec, Manitoba and Saskatchewan, has approved 26 new Canadian records and recommended that ornamental swimming be included in the Olympic games.

At Havre de Grace, Md., Mrs. M. E. Whitney's Bullet Proof closed with a rush to win the \$30,000-added Chesapeake stakes ahead of Seonay and Royal Governor, but his time for the 1-16th miles—1:44 4-5—was only a cut above average.

A mild upset marked the six-furlong feature at the Churchill Downs opening in Louisville when King Bay finished 1-2 lengths ahead of On Trust, California's oldest derby hope. King Bay clocked off the six panels in 1:11 4-5, but his connections said the colt will probably pass up the derby for the Freekness.

At New York a crowd of 46,000 watched Polynesian a strong choice in the \$30,000 Excelsior Handicap but Greenree Stable's Coincidence won by four lengths over the Elmendorf color-bearer. Let's Dance was third in the 1-16th-mile event, run in 1:44.
