Novelty and Thrills in Novarro's Newest

RAMON, USUALLY IN BRILLIANT UNIFORM, WEARS DUNGAREES AND SWEATER IN THIS STIRRING SEA STORY OF LIFE IN THE ORIENT.

Ramon Novarro, hero of "Ben-Hur" and many a role in which he wore a brilliant uniform, furnishes a surprise, and a very refreshing one in "Across to Singapore," his newest starring vehicle at the Prince Edward Theatre. For he appears as a sailor of the old "windjammer" days; a mariner in sweater and dungarees, before the mast, in a whirlwind adventure of sea storms, Oriental battles and other thrilling episodes that form a thunderous background for an entrancing love story.

The new Metro-Goldwyn Mayer production is one of the most elaborate of Novarro's recent pictures. Laid in New England, on the high seas, and in the Orient, it has an ever-shifting locale that keeps pace with the lightning-like action of the play. Its drama is masterly; the story is based on the romance by Ben Ames Williams, noted Saturday Evening Post author. Novarro plays a sailor, one of

three seafaring brothers, and a love of quest hurls him into a maelstrom of adventure. As the young sailor, battling human passions and the elements, Novarro has a role in which he proves a powerful delineator of human emotions. The terrific storm at sea, the attack of the Oriental pirates and the mutiny on deck, are all splendidly done under the expert direction of William Nigh.

Joan Crawford makes a very beautiful heroine, and her acting is perfect in the role of the New England girl thrust into a gripping adventure in the Orient. Ernest Torrence as the older brother is a dominant figure in the powerful tale and James Mason as the evil mate has an equally powerful role. Anna May Wong plays a seductive Oriental charmer who ever leave home. Duke Martin and Dan Wolheim are effectively cast as sailors and Frank Currier and Edward Connelly offer two realistic character delineations. The settings, reproducing Singapore and the New England village, are constructed on an elaborate scale and are realistically convincing. The storm at sea is exciting and even alarming in its intensity.

The total value of the catch this year is somewhat less than it was last year. This is due to the fact that, on account of the mild weather, no ice has formed in the bays, and fishing for smelts by this means was, therefore, impossible.

Rear Admiral on Sea Disasters

BOSTON, Mass., Dec. 21.—In the opinion of Rear Admiral Sims, interviewed by a representative of the Boston Transcript relative to the Vestr's tragedy, the travelling public does not know enough to demand the safety necessary to prevent a disaster such as that which occurred to the Vestr's, and the public must be convinced that under present conditions any sea journey is fraught with the possible danger of death.

Public demand for safety has never been sufficiently continuous or well informed to be effective, said Admiral Sims. The problem is not an engineering one so much as an economic one. The shipowners cannot deal with it alone; no steamship can reach the maximum of safety by itself, and the solution lies in a public demand that will reflect itself in an international agreement.

"People should understand that when they go to sea they run a certain amount of risk," said the Admiral. "On the best built and best equipped steamers sailing today, after thorough inspection under present laws, many of the passengers must lose their lives in case disaster involving loss of the vessel occurs under any of the following conditions:

"They cannot be saved if the sea is too rough for open boats to live. "In bad weather outside the Gulf Stream, many would perish before they could be picked up. "In a considerable sea the boats cannot be lowered by tackles from their great height, by necessarily untrained crews, without disaster to many of them. The deck of a ship from which boats must be lowered may be sixty feet above the water. If the ship is rolling ten degrees these boats may swing out thirty or forty feet from the side of the ship and then swing back against the side. They can be launched only from one side when the list is heavy."
