Gasperi Resigns For Third Time

ROME, May 14 (AP)—Aloisio de Gasperi resigned as premier of Italy for the third time in 19 months as the result of a feud between his Centrist Christian Democratic Party and Communists and Socialists which ripped his three-party coalition cabinet. Provisional President Enrico de Nicola received the cabinet's resignation just before the constituent assembly was to start debate on de Gasperi's rigorous program to combat a spiral of inflation. Life And N. Y. Times To Publish Churchill Book

NEW YORK, May 14 (AP)—Life magazine and the New York Times announced today that they had obtained United States publication rights for Winston Churchill's wartime memoirs, already written in large part by the former British prime minister. The announcement indicated that the price was more than \$1,000,000. The memoirs are expected to consist of 1,000,000 words to be published in five volumes. They will begin with the years preceding the Second World War when Churchill opposed his government's appeasement policy and extend through the conflict. During most of the war, Churchill headed the British coalition government.

Life and the New York Times expect to begin publication of material from the first volume next January, and to follow with portions of the other volumes at approximately six-month intervals. Churchill began writing his memoirs in the fall of 1946, aided by a diary which he kept daily, the Life-New York Times announcement said. The volumes will be published in book form by Houghton Mifflin Company after portions have appeared in the magazine and newspaper. Churchill has written many books, including "The World Crisis," an analysis of Allied strategy in the First World War, and a noted four-volume "Life of Marlborough."

The Montreal Standard holds rights for publication in Canada of the memoirs.

however, should not be touched. This is the time, too, to take out adenoids that are obstructing the child's nose. Adenoids are not necessary. They are growths that need removal, the sooner the better. They reduce the child's supply of clean fresh air to the lungs, a serious matter.

Check Teeth

It is the season, too, to have the children's teeth examined. The dentist should be visited every six months, oftener if he finds anything wrong. The first teeth are very important and should be kept in as good condition as possible. And don't let them have cavities that are untreated. In this way, crooked permanent teeth can be avoided.

Then there are the vaccinations demanded for entrance to school. Get them over with in the fine spring weather, so that when September comes and the children are about to enter school, they will be ready.

Britain's Option To Newfoundland

LONDON, May 14 (Reuters)—A British government announcement that it had given Newfoundland the option of continued government by commission with Britain as financial underwriter or of resuming responsible government, managing an exchequer not but marked by the old country, was strongly attacked today by two Conservative newspapers.

The Daily Express, owned by Lord Beaverbrook, in an editorial headed: "Shame" said the Labor Government had adopted a "cold, graceless, ungenerous and chuckle-headed" attitude. The Daily Telegraph said that the ancient colony at the mouth of the Gulf of St. Lawrence had a third choice, the possibility of "incorporation as a tenth province of Canada."

The government stand was announced yesterday by Viscount Addison, dominions secretary, in the House of Lords, and by A.G. Bot-

tomley, dominions undersecretary, in the House of Commons.

Both newspapers stressed Newfoundland's contribution in manpower to the war endeavor.

The Daily Express meanwhile quoted Maj. Peter Cahin, one of the Newfoundland delegates just returned to that country, as saying in a transatlantic telephone interview that "we got a very poor show from your Lord Addison."

New Mill Can Roll Steel At Fast Rate

WEIRTON, W. Va., May 14 (AP)—A new marvel of production which can produce water-thin steel at a mile-a-minute pace is in operation here.

"It's the Weirton Steel Company's new No. 6 cold strip mill which, officials say, can roll steel at a pace one-third faster than the best previous record. Weirton officials said the mill's top speed approximates 6,000 feet a minute. It can produce a coil

of steel of tin plate thickness weighing five tons in less than five minutes. The mill's output will consist mainly of tinplate gauges, ranging from 6-1,000 to 15-1,000 of an inch in thickness. However, the unit can roll thicker gauge up to 25 gauge, approximately 11-1,000 of an inch thick.
