### IN MEMORIAM

MR. DAVID SHEPHERD

The sudden death occurred yesterday morning of Mr. David Shepherd, a well known carpenter of this city.

### Crop Report

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches. The Branch Managers have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

#### GENERAL

Rains following a week of exceptionally hot weather have improved the situation in the Prairie Provinces. Except in East and Southeast Alberta and a few parts of Saskatchewan where rain is sorely needed, wheat is in the shot, blade and while the season is backward the conditions in the Prairie Provinces on the whole are fairly satisfactory. In Ontario the season is still about ten days late but good growth is now being made. In Quebec Province an average hay crop is expected. In some parts of the Maritime Provinces rain is needed but reports are favourable generally. In British Columbia hot dry weather continues and rain is badly needed.

#### PRAIRIE PROVINCES

EDMONTON DISTRICT.—The whole district has been benefited by heavy rains in the past two days following a period of the hottest weather experienced in many years.

CALGARY DISTRICT.—Rain is needed in Northeastern area but

generally speaking prospects good. Wheat well in shot of hay is expected. Roots are late blade and fall rye headed out, but are doing well. Fruit prospects are good. Strawberries are fairly plentiful. Pasture are only fair.

West and South crops progressing favourably, conditions satisfactory in North. SASKATOON DISTRICT.—Exceptionally hot weather with insufficient rain has been experienced, during the past week. With further rains prospects will be fair in some districts, but only light crops are now expected in districts tributary to Saskatoon and North Battleford. The situation generally is not promising. Pastures are poor and hay crop light. REGINA DISTRICT.—Crops generally standing up well. Conditions best in Southwestern Saskatchewan. WINNIPEG DISTRICT.—Good rains have improved the situation. Wheat generally is in shot blade. The condition of coarse grains is fairly satisfactory.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

The season is still about ten days late but good growth is now being made and indications are favourable for a good average crop. Fall wheat very promising. It is well headed out with crop prospect above average. Prospects are for an average crop of Spring grains. Corn is backward but an average crop is expected. Hay generally will be a good average crop. Clover and alfalfa are excellent. Cutting has commenced. Roots are promising. Pasture generally satisfactory. Fruit prospects are good.

#### PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

Grain crops generally are of good appearance. An average crop time good. Wheat well in shot of hay is expected. Roots are late blade and fall rye headed out, but are doing well. Fruit prospects are good. Strawberries are fairly plentiful. Pasture are only fair.

#### NEW BRUNSWICK

Potatoes are doing well but the crops generally suffering from lack of rain.

#### MARITIME PROVINCES

Potatoes are doing well but the crops generally suffering from lack of rain.

#### NOVA SCOTIA and PE

EDWARD ISLAND.—General conditions are excellent. The apple crop is uneven. Strawberries are plentiful everywhere.

#### PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

Haying is well under way. A good grain crop is expected in the Fraser Valley, elsewhere grasshoppers are causing damage in the Okanagan and belt. Potatoes fair to good. Apples and pears are setting well, but will be a short crop. Small fruits are giving a fair crop. Pasture poor. Good crop of potatoes in Northern districts.
