Worry Whether Stalin Can Apply Brakes

United States State Department officials, worried whether even Stalin can apply the brakes to Communist expansion before it leads to war, could be thinking about Georgi Dimitrov in Bulgaria and "Little Joe" Tito in Yugoslavia.

They could also be thinking about the Molotov clique in Moscow.

Reports of "international brigades" and troop movements in Albania and Yugoslavia have heightened the feeling of Greece's insecurity.

Yugoslav activities in connection with the Italian election also create tension. There are indications that only the Allied army in Trieste stands between Italy and direct intervention.

A well-informed friend called me a day or so ago to ask if I had heard that Yugoslav troops in civilian clothes were infiltrating Northern Italy. I hadn't heard of it, couldn't confirm it and doubted it because of the close watch on the demarcation line. But it is certainly what Tito would like to do.

Tito is reputed to have an army of 100,000 Russian-equipped and partially Russian-officered men. It has been described as the best army in Europe.

He and the Kremlin, which never seems to understand the real

meaning of world events, might think there was a chance of using this army without starting a general war. They might hope for local successes while Russia disclaimed responsibility. Then the lid would be blown sky high.

On the other possibility that Stalin couldn't stop the success-bloated Communists of Eastern Europe even if he wanted to, there are some interesting sidelights.

Stalin has long been considered more Conservative with regard to unleashing the "world revolution" than Molotov, Zhdanov and some of the other Politburo members. Immediately after the Prague

coup informed Czechs, mindful of Stalin's promises that their independence would be respected, believed that his wishes had been evaded. They said Stalin, in Poland and elsewhere, had considered economic and diplomatic co-operation to be sufficient without invoking roughshod methods. They thought the revolutionaries had taken matters into their own hands.

All of this, although speculative, has a bearing on whether Russia will now heed America's warning that further efforts at expansion will be resisted firmly, even if it comes to a test of arms.
