EXTRADITION MATTER AGAIN BROUGHT UP

BERLIN, March 12.—The German Charge d'Affaires in London has handed to Premier Lloyd George a note regarding the entente extradition list, it was announced today. After asserting that the imperial court will be guarded only by consideration of justice and will conduct an impartial inquiry, the note demands that the arrest of Germans in the occupied territories on charges similar to those enumerated in the extradition list shall cease, and that those arrested shall be delivered to German courts. The release of Germans who, for similar reasons, have been detained in war prison camps also is asked for. The note finally demands that the Allies abandon the reservations regarding their right to try for crimes committed during the war any Germans not mentioned in the list it encountered on allied territory, saying that incidents arising out of the war should be consigned to oblivion with the advent of peace. Otherwise the note says a restoration of normal relations between the different nationalities is hardly conceivable and that German government on its part, will be obliged

to take measures with a view to the expiation of punishment acts committed during the war against Germans by allied subjects.

IN MEMORIAM

Much sympathy is felt for Mrs. William MacKinnon and daughter, Mary Etta, and son, William Angus for the loss of a loving husband and father, who died with pneumonia, February 12th, on P. E. Island, while there attending to business. Mr. MacKinnon was expected home by his family when a telegram was received by them of his illness. Mrs. MacKinnon left on the first train but he had passed out of life before she arrived there. Mr. MacKinnon was a large man with a cheerful disposition and beloved by all who knew him. He was born on P. E. Island on March 12, 1871. He came to the United States seventeen years ago and resided in Dorchester, Mass. He was a member of the Foresters, Odd Fellows and Scottish Clans, and an active member of the Presbyterian Church for many years. Besides his family, he leaves to mourn, five brothers and three sisters.

HINTS FOR The Motorist

SPARK KNOCK

A. E. V. writes: My engine develops a substantial knock, when the spark is fully advanced, which stops only when the full retard is used. I do not think that this is caused by carbon deposits. What is your theory about it?

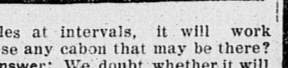


Answer: Are you sure that the timer is set correctly upon its shaft? If it is set too greatly advanced you would not be able to run without a knock, with the lever in its advanced position. We do not know the exact spark timing for your engine and ignition system but as a general proposition the setting of the breaker-points should be such that with the spark lever fully retarded they should be on the point of separating when the piston in the cylinder that is to fire, is exactly at the top of its stroke. In cases the timing is much earlier than this you should hardly expect to be able to use the full advance.

KEROSENING CYLINDERS M. writes: My car is laid up for the winter and I wish to know whether if I put kerosene into the cylinders through the spark-plug holes at intervals, it will work loose any carbon that may be there? Answer: We doubt whether it will have much effect in this direction and we fear that it will make the engine hard to turn over, when you wish to start it in the spring. It would be better to apply a good liquid carbon remover, according to directions as soon as you put the car into service again, leaving the cylinders well supplied with engine oil during the lay-up period. The successful use of carbon removing liquids requires that the engine be run after the application, and if the liquid is left in the cylinders deposits which may have been loosened remain and harden again, instead of being forced out with the exhaust.

PLATINUM VS. TUNGSTEN BREAKER-POINTS

J. H. writes: My small six-cylinder car, although it has recently been overhauled at times will not do better than 10 miles on the gallon of gasoline. The carburetor is hot-water jacketed and takes hot air. Please tell me if the use of platinum instead of tungsten points on the make-and-break of the igniter will enable me to obtain better mileage. Answer: Assuming that ignition is perfectly reliable with the tungsten points, you cannot expect increased fuel economy from the use of platinum. Are you absolutely sure that the ignition timing is as far advanced as permissible? A very little lateness results in very large fuel waste. Hot water jacket-



ing of the carburetor is of little use with present-day fuel and if your intake manifold is exposed so that it can be exhaust jacketed, we advise you to have this done.

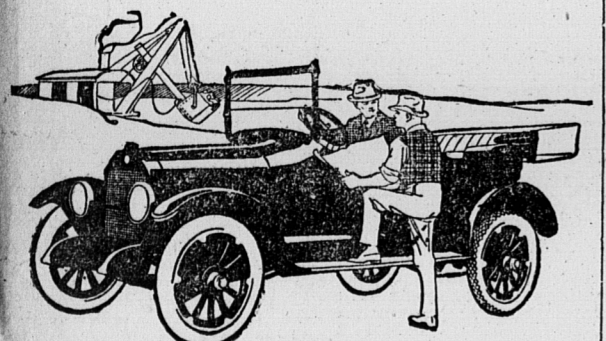
