Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

The sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitation house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 20 acres and erect a house worth \$3.00.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

CRITICISM OF SUNDAY

SLUR ON GOOD PEOPLE

This Is Reply of Rev. Dr. MacInnis Formerly of Valleyfield, P. E. I., to Sermon of Rev. Dr. Betts—South Presbyterian Church Crowded When Its Pastor Speaks in Defence of Evangelist.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Feb. 23.—"When a man slurs 20,000 of the finest people in Syracuse, I will not be silent."

This was the chief reason offered last night by Rev. Dr. John Murdoch MacInnis at the South Presbyterian Church to the criticism of Rev. Billy Sunday and his methods by Rev. Dr. F. W. Betts, pastor of the First Universalist Church.

There were 1225 persons in the church filling the auditorium, Sunday school rooms and all available space in the choir and on the platform. This was the largest congregation in the church's history.

Rev. Dr. MacInnis, who was born in Valleyfield, P. E. I., took the position that Dr. Betts cast reflections upon all Presbyterians in the city as well as members of all other churches included in the Sunday Campaign when he declared that:

"There is no doubt he does a real thing for a crude class of booze fighters."

SUNDAY NOT BIGOT.

Dr. MacInnis acknowledges his own early prejudice against the evangelist, his inability to agree entirely with Sunday's contentions of a theological or doctrinal nature, but declared vehemently that Billy was no "far-sighted fanatic and bigot."

He also declared that it was with courteous regard for the denominational difference between Rev. Dr. Betts, John H. Applebee and Dr. Alfred Guttman, that the members of the Ministerial Association formed the Syracuse Evangelical Association to further the Sunday campaign instead of humiliating these clergymen by bringing the evangelist here by a majority vote in the Ministerial Association.

After repeating the alleged announcement of Dr. Betts that if any Billy Sunday champion desired to take issue with his contentions, he would open a controversy, Dr. MacInnis asked this question:

"WHO'S INTOLERANT?"

"If Billy Sunday is intolerant, what about this other man? Sunday is a bigot because he won't believe what Dr. Betts believes and Dr. Betts won't believe what Billy Sunday says. If Mr. Sunday is a bigot, what is Dr. Betts? Then after Dr. Betts had had his say, he doesn't want anyone else to say anything and if they do he will open a controversy. What's that?"

Dr. MacInnis began his sermon by regarding the vast congregation gathered as a tribute to Billy Sunday. "I do not now offer apology for taking up this subject," he continued. "I have never indulged in personalities, but as a minister of Jesus Christ and of this church mentioned in a certain report of an attack in the daily press, it would be criminal for me to keep silent."

"My relations with Dr. Betts have always been pleasant. I have always found him to be a scholarly, kind, courteous gentleman, and have always respected all faithful men. He is well posted in current events and an honorable minister of his church."

"AROUSSED TO ARMS."

"Tonight I am called upon to deal with certain statements made by Dr. Betts, for while I appreciate that men may differ in regard to the acceptance of Jesus Christ as Lord and Master and yet be brothers in the great work of uplifting humanity, to see my motives impugned and reflections brought upon my church and my people, stir my blood and arouse me to arms, to love my God, and in doing so, fight for Him."

Dr. MacInnis then proceeded to show that Billy Sunday was ordained a Presbyterian minister, although he had not taken the usual thorough educational route, and why he had been given the degree of doctor of divinity.

Showing by this reference to Sunday's ordination that he had been recognized as a powerful preacher and an honorable member of the church, Dr. MacInnis proceeded to declare that "This man has been singled out as a far-sighted fanatic and bigot. I refute both charges, although I was inclined to think so before I knew him as well as I do now."

spending much time among men of all classes while they were at work of his interest in their demand for better wages and his personal experiences with their unions. He also told of visiting with millionaires, all of which he did to get the human, personal point of view away from the atmosphere of the church.

"I would let my right hand wither away before I would tell of these things for the purpose of advertising my church or increasing my popularity. I did it because I realized that if we are to do our part in the regeneration of society, we must know how the other man feels, suffers and what he has to contend with. When a man impugns my motives and talks platitudes and glittering generalities, I feel called upon to answer."

"What is the creature they call society? I never saw it. I never saw this animal they call a corporation. I have always found that they can be reached only by reaching the individual, for it is not society or the corporation, but the individual that goes to hell. If the individual is bad, then society is bad; if the person is good, then society will be good."

BILLY GOT INDIVIDUAL.

"Billy Sunday preached a gospel that got at the individual because he contended that through the individual society could be saved and only in that way."

Dr. MacInnis then took up the charge of Dr. Betts that "The message of Sunday falls short of regeneration when it comes to obligation to fellow men."

"Did he fall short in this respect?" asked Dr. MacInnis. "He told men to treat square with their wives and families and to get right with God. He pointed out man's individual responsibility because the family is the beginning of society."

"The atmosphere in this city was changed by reason of the influence of Sunday. When this man says that the gospel fell short of regeneration, I do not understand. No man ever came to this city who did so much for the regeneration of society as Billy Sunday."

"HONEST AND GENEROUS."

"I learned what an absolutely honest, kind, generous man he was. A man can be, as he is, enthusiastic and uncompromising in his stand for great truths and yet not be a bigot. Billy Sunday makes no apology for believing that God is the Father, and Jesus Christ, His son. He is consistent and courageous in his activities. Because he believes as he does he is striving to save souls of men."

"If I saw a child asleep on the railroad track in front of an approaching train and I ran to save its life, would I be a bigot and a fanatic because I was uncompromising in my effort to save the child? If I stopped to philosophize and place flowers upon the track and do nothing to save the child I would be a fanatic, a fool and a criminal."

"Sunday believes when he preaches with his whole soul, and I confess that I do not agree with some of his statements. I have studied the New Testament for twenty years of my life to try to find out what it teaches."

GOT NOTHING BUT HELL.

"I have striven with all my mind and soul to get the truth regarding the ultimate end of unbelievers. I have tried to study the New Testament in Hebrew, German, Gaelic, but I have got nothing but hell out of it. I am just as honest in my desire to learn as any man. I have read everything I could find, but for the life of me I can find nothing but what Sunday contends."

The minister recalled the work of Martin Luther, Calvin, John and Charles Wesley, Whitfield, Moody, Johnna and Edwards and then declared: "If these men were fanatics, then I say, God fill this land with fanatics and get away with some of the icebergs."

Regarding the purposes for which Sunday was called to this city, Dr. MacInnis said: "The churches did not bring Sunday here to raise the ethical standards of the community, but to bring members into the churches, is the charge Dr. Betts made. This charge impugns the ministers and we are accused of not recognizing the welfare of the community."

DID NOT LIKE BILLY'S WAY.

"While I shall answer this charge for myself only, I believe that what I may say will also apply to all other ministers who worked with Sunday. I was prejudiced against Sunday and his methods did not meet with my approval."

"I was not in desperate need of more members, for my congregation was as large as I could handle, larger than I could care for as I wished to. My salary was always paid up to the full and I could get it in advance if needed it. Why should I want more members and have more work to do?"

"On the other hand, does this man mean to impugn our motives? Does he love this city more than we? Is he more interested in the community welfare than we are? I call God to witness that I love this city and I will do all in my power to advance its interests."

WORRIED AT FIRST.

"While I did not agree with Sunday, I realized that he could do what we had not been able to do, and I put my own feelings aside. I confess that for the first few nights I was worried and wondered if we had brought religion into disrespect. Now, I ask you, who was the broader man; who is the larger and more tolerant?"

At this point Dr. MacInnis told of

SUPERIOR PEOPLE? HE ASKS.

"Dr. Betts says that Sunday does a real thing for a certain class of crude booze fighters and far more than he handles that kind of goods at this acquisition of new members. By this statement he assumes that his people are superior to a certain class of booze fighters, and are so cultured that Sunday could not do anything for them."

Dr. MacInnis then referred to the 342 new members in his church as a result of the campaign, and declared that he was proud of them, and that there were no better people in the community.

"When Dr. Betts challenges a comparison of people he is on dangerous ground," declared Dr. MacInnis. "President Wilson, Vice-President Marshall and Governor Whitman are members of the Presbyterian church. Many other great men of the country, past and present, that I could name are members of this church. They are the kind of goods we deal in on this corner."

BED-MAKING AND BEAUTY CULTURE.

Bed-making after butter making calls for more graceful motions than any other part of the household. George Elliot tells us in "Adam Bede," it was when the unfortunate little Hetty was making butter that Arthur discovered how beautiful were all her movements. The creamers have taken all that opportunity from the present-day women, but bed-making is here to stay, so it behooves us to get all the benefit from it that we can.
