Prof. E. D. McPhee Gets Appointment

(The A. T. A. Magazine, Edmonton)
With the appointment of Professor E. D. McPhee of the University of Alberta, to succeed Dr. Bridges at the University of Toronto, a brilliant chapter in the history of education in Alberta is brought to a close. Mr. McPhee came to the University of Alberta at the time when the Alberta Teachers' Alliance first brought forward its proposal of greater facilities for education in educational psychology, educational measurement, educational testing, and mental hygiene. A large number of Edmonton teachers enrolled for these classes at the University, and now the Calgary teachers are offered the same facilities by means of special lectures. This is a great achievement in two years is truly remarkable. Nothing quite like this has happened elsewhere in Canada.
It was Professor McPhee's firm conviction that teaching a profession until teachers are required to teach, and are trained in a scientific technique which no mere layman can employ successfully, is the great trouble with teaching under present conditions, thinks Professor McPhee, is that everybody knows something of it, and has very few teachers who have had much about it. This is decidedly not a favorable environment for professional status.
Professor McPhee was not a member of the academic profession. He found time to address public gatherings, business meetings, and lectures at various points. His brilliant work and untiring zeal in the cause of education will never be forgotten by the teachers of Alberta, and he takes with him the best wishes of the Alberta Teachers' Alliance for success in his new field.
Prof. McPhee claims P. E. Island as his native place although born in New Brunswick where his parents resided a few years, but were both born here. His mother was a Miss Leard of Tryon, she and Prof. Alden Dawson's mother of the late Chas. M. Leard of Tryon, being McPhee's father H. A. McPhee and step mother (Miss Green) of Ottawa now reside in Tryon, his mother having died while he was serving his country in France. Prof. McPhee entered Acadia one year previous to the war but enlisted at the first call to arms and served with honour the whole term, first in the war of 1914 and then as private and was promoted on more than one occasion. Entered Edinburgh University where he completed his studies and has since been engaged in Acadia a year. Edmonton University three years and now has entered on professional duties in Toronto University as above.

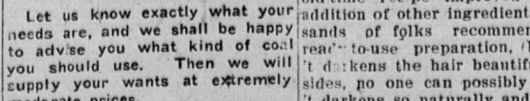

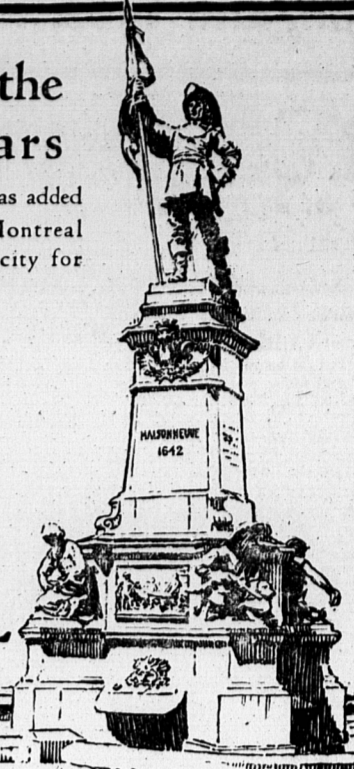

PARIS, Nov. 1.—Paris has sounded the death-knell of the strap shoe. Sandals cut-away slippers and bar shoes have enjoyed a long run of popularity, but now they are giving way to jester and long-pointed models covering the instep. Some of the evening shoes have a tiny frill of metallic lace at the back of the ankle.
A pretty innovation is the medieval-looking dancing shoe of either white or pale-colored satin, split down nearly to the toe, but laced high up in the instep with satin ribbon. It is lowheeled and the lacings are wide apart, giving a distinctly quaint appearance.
The court shoe is the smartest model to wear in the street. It should be absolutely untrimmed, narrow and close fitting. Bronze kid and dandy straitened lizard skin are the favored patterns. The jester shoe is a close rival, particularly in black patent leather.
Red, green and blue sandals have been superseded by porpoise and sharkie skin couc and lace-up shoes.

Fashionable Laces

Paris is paying special attention to the laces themselves. They are made of narrow strips of suede and buckskin, circle ribbon-tubular patterned leather in red and green, and black with white stripes.
Lace-up shoes of waxed satin in black with scarlet laces and heels are popular for afternoon dances. Silver tinsel brocade and peach-colored satin are also greatly favored.
A small jewel-set watch mounted on one shoe, instead of a buckle or other ornament is another fashion. The watch has a magnifying glass, so that the wearer does not have to raise her foot unduly in order to see the time.

To Take Responsibility of Granting Licences

(Special to the Guardian)
OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 31.—The publication of correspondence between Hon. Jacques Bureau, and Attorney General Nicks with respect to the granting by the Federal Department of Customs of licences to distilleries and breweries in Ontario has so far elicited no official reply from Mr. Bureau.
The Minister of Customs since his arrival in Ottawa has been tied up in meetings of the Treasury Board and cabinet council and has not had an opportunity to examine the files of his Department or to consult with the officials there. Until he has done so he declines to give any statement for publication. It is intimated however that the policy of the Department under Mr. Bureau is to take full responsibility for the granting of licences and to abandon the former policy of consultation with the province involved. The power of granting licences is in the jurisdiction of the federal authorities and it is apparently the feeling of the Minister that there can be no dual responsibility in the matter.
