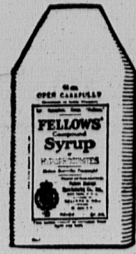


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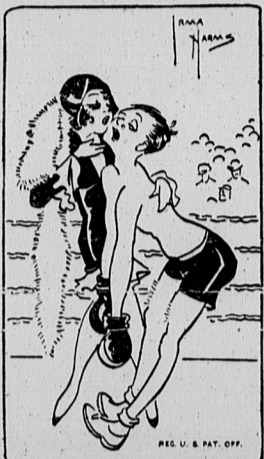
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WELFARE WORK STEADILY GROWING

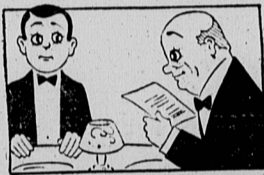
TORONTO, Ont., June 7.—(By The Canadian Press)—The city's increasing interest in child welfare work is showing remarkable results, according to Dr. Alan Brown, professor of pediatrics at the University of Toronto and physician-in-chief at the Hospital-for-Sick-Children, who addressed delegates to the Ontario Medical Association's Convention. Statistics over a period of 15 years from 1914

to 1929 showed that the infant death rate had dropped from 155.6 deaths per 1,000 births to 62 per 1,000.
