TORONTO'S WORST BLOCKADE.

The worst freight blockade in the history of Toronto exists at the present time. It is estimated that 2000 cars of freight is in the local yards.

NEWLINES TO BE OPENED.

TORONTO, April 9—It would appear that the prosecution in the Gamey investigation have decided to open some new lines of enquiry. When the court adjourned yesterday it was understood that the investigation was practically concluded, and that there remained only the address of counsel. The prosecution will put in some further evidence.

FURTHER WITNESSES TO BE CALLED.

This morning D. McPherson applied for thirty original subpoenas and thirty copies. This would indicate that there are thirty witnesses yet to call. But the subpoenas were not filled in the morning.

TRANSVAAL LOAN OVERSUBSCRIBED

LONDON, May 7.—The Transvaal loan of \$175,000,000 will be issued at par, with interest at three per cent. It is redeemable in 1913.

The rush for prospectus was an unprecedented one. At the hour of issue thousands of people stood in the pouring rain, four deep, in the streets leading to the Bank of England.

The scene in the lobbies of the bank during the first issuing of the prospectuses resembled a football scrimmage in which the weakest went to the wall. It was understood late this afternoon that the Transvaal loan had already been subscribed for 20 times.

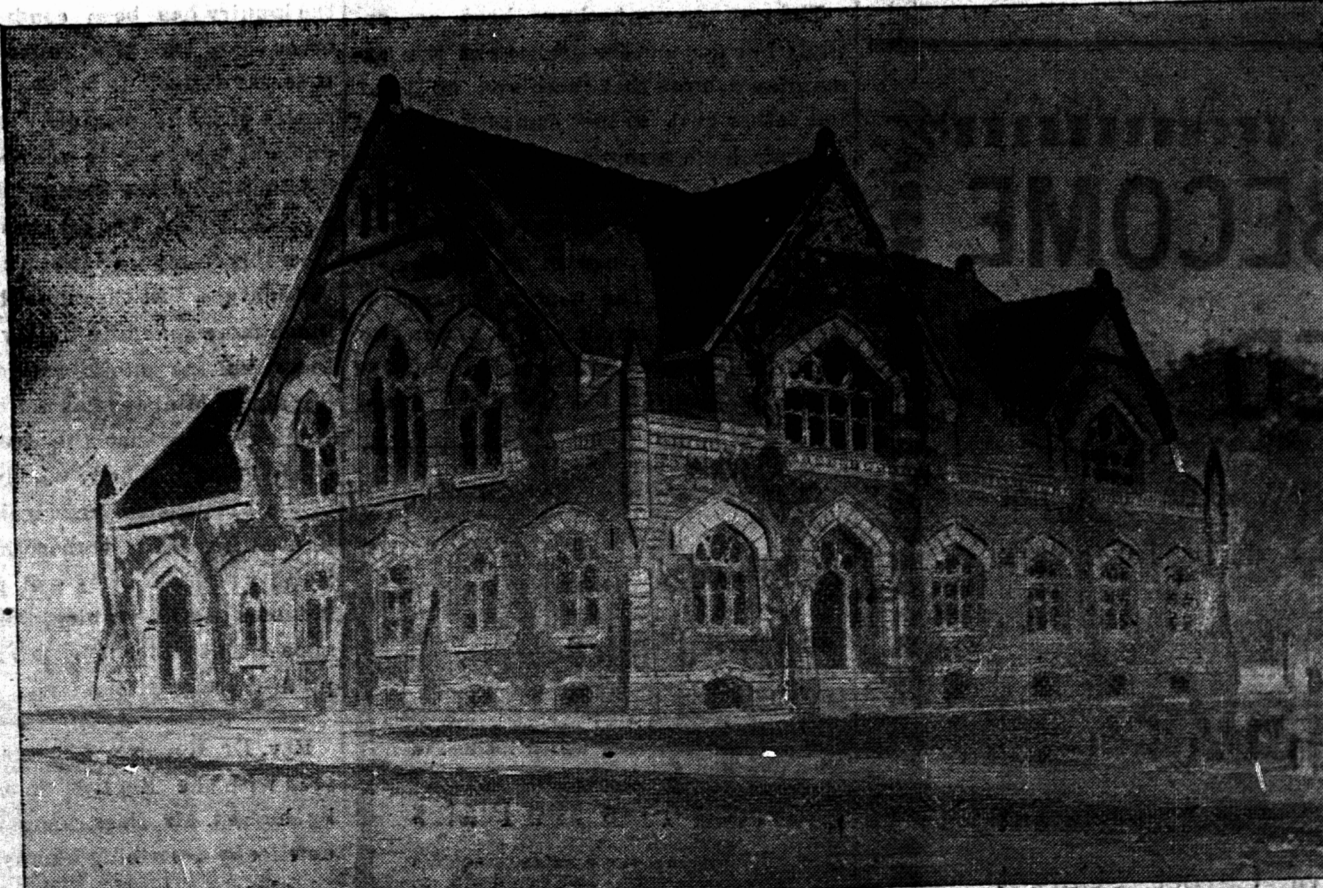

It is likely tenders will be called on new plans for the erection of a building to cost in the vicinity of \$20,000.
