—Mr. Harry Green, of St. John, N. B., motored to Summerside to spend a few days with friends in Summerside.

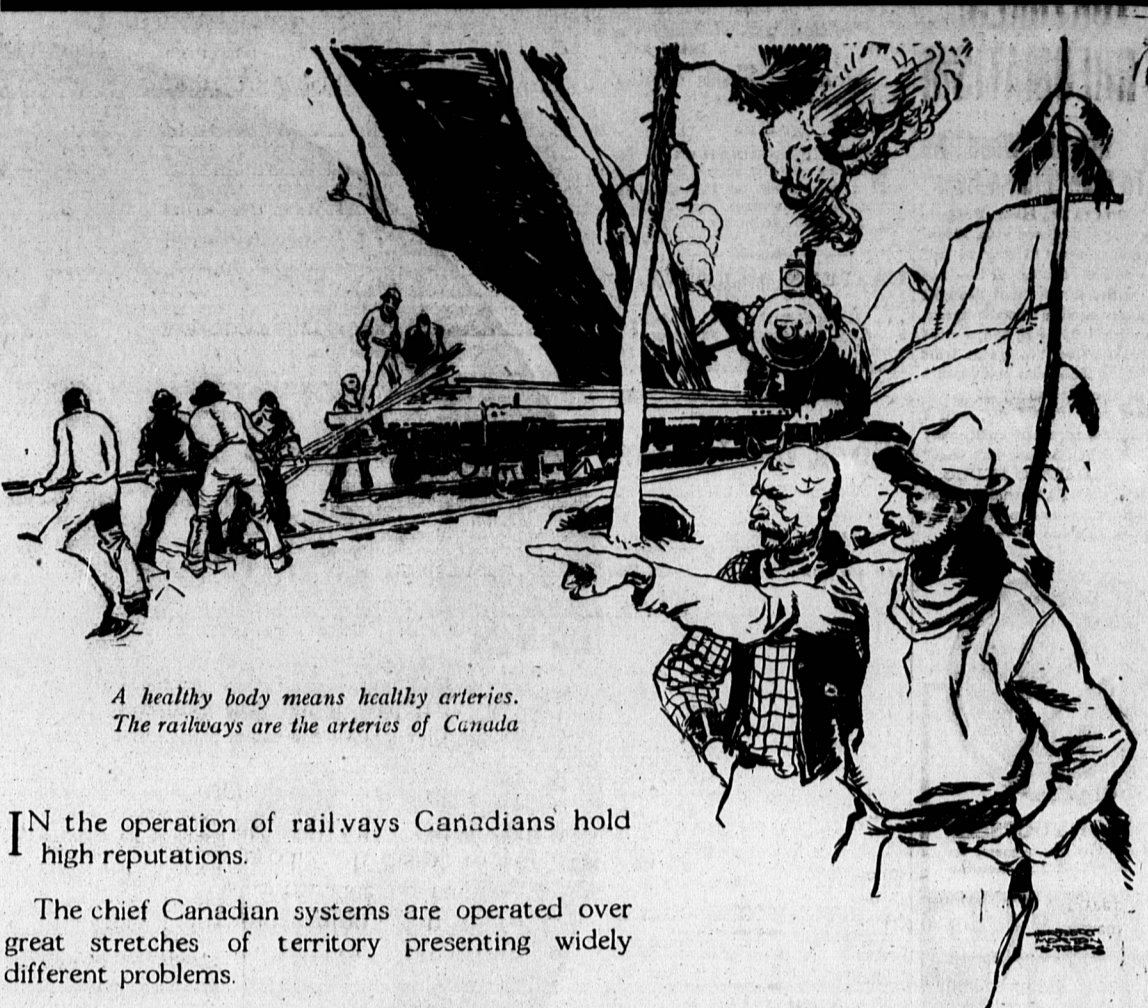
