LATE DELIVERY OF MAILS.—Complaint was received by the Guardian last night that notwithstanding the mail by the Stanley was not received here until 9:30 o'clock, the Post Office was closed promptly at 6 p.m. and many people were disappointed in not being able to obtain letters to their boxes. Some arrangements ought to be made on such occasions for keeping the office open till the summer hour of closing.

THE ICE BOATS.—The trip by the ice boats in the crossing on Wednesday was perhaps one of the most trying in the history of the service. The blinding rain storm literally drenched the men to the skin. Yesterday the trip was a much pleasanter one, the weather being ideal. The incoming boats brought 62 bags mail which had been delivered at Sackville in the morning and carried thence by special to Tormentine. This mail was delivered at all points in Prince Edward Island twenty-four hours earlier than had it come either by Charlottetown or Georgetown. The Post Office and Marine Departments are to be commended on their keeping this route in commission until all danger of delay on the other routes is over. The crews of these boats as well as their captains will brave any kind of weather or any condition of ice to "deliver the goods."

HOW TO CLEAN YOUR GUN.
There are two methods used for cleaning a gun barrel. The first is the hot water treatment, but it should only be used if your supply of powder solvent is exhausted and you are far from a store. Boiling water is an excellent solvent for the harmful ingredients of fouling. When poured down your barrel, it removes acids that may be present and carries away the various residues which are obviously more soluble in water than in oil. The hot water treatment, however, is very dirty and inconvenient when carried out on a small scale, and has the objection of not, as a rule, being available immediately after shooting, and unless you are careful to protect your stock and fore-end, you may injure these wood parts. If possible you should secure a good lubricant solvent and rust preventive. A small rag will saturated with an oily, non-corrosive mixture of this sort, pulled through the barrel again and again, will keep your arms in prime condition, if used after each day's shooting.
