PRICES PUSH TRADING SLOW FORWARD IN WINNIPEG N.Y. EXCHANGE GRAIN MARKET

Winnipeg, Aug. 10.—(A.P.)—In sympathy with the firm tone displayed in outside markets, wheat futures prices rose on the Winnipeg Grain market today.

Final quotations were about a cent under the high points of the day however, due to a late-session selling movement which though not very large, was sufficient to pare earlier gains.

The alcohol issues proved to be the most palatable of the list, advances in this group ranging from 1 to 6. A keen appetite for motor shares was also evident.

A firm trend was revealed in the commodity markets, too, although performance there was not quite on a par with stocks.

U. S. DOLLAR EASIER

The United States dollar was slightly easier in the foreign exchange markets, but fluctuations were narrow and trading quiet.

IN MEMORIAM Foreign Exchange

MRS. RODERICK A. McDONALD (Associated Press) NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—Foreign exchange steady, Great Britain demand, high 4.49%, low 4.48%, close 4.49%; 60 day bills, 4.48 1-16; France 5.31; Italy 7.14; Belgium 13.95; Germany, 52.40; Canada 94.

There passed away in Charlottetown on Monday, August 7th, after an illness of only three months, Mary E. McIsaac, beloved wife of Roderick A. McDonald, retired C. N. R. conductor.

During her illness Mrs. McDonald received all possible medical attention and was tenderly nursed by her daughter Mary. She received the last rites of the church and had the consolation of having her son, the Rev. Bennett McDonald, with her during her illness.

She was born 62 years ago at St. Peter's Bay, the daughter of Hilary McIsaac and Sophia McDonald.

A devoted member of St. Dunstan's parish and of St. Joseph's Sodality she always took a deep active interest in all its charitable activities. She leaves to mourn besides a sorrowing husband, five children, Rev. Bennett McDonald, curate at Summerside, Mary, R.N., of Alliston, Mass.; Reta, Helen and Roderick at home; also three sisters, Mrs. John G. McInnis, Mrs. Robert Lewis and Mrs. Dugald McDonald. One sister, Mrs. John J. McInnis, predeceased her seven months ago.

The funeral took place Wednesday morning at ten o'clock.

MRS. CHARLES E. AYERS—When the Angel of Death makes known its presence, a gloom is always cast over a community and so it was in Wellington on the night of July 30, 1933, when it was learned that Isabelle, dearly beloved wife of Charles E. Ayers, had quietly passed away, strengthened and comforted in her last moments by the rites of the Holy Catholic Church, administered by her pastor, Rev. Urban Gillis, and her bedside surrounded by relatives and friends.

Stricken with a fatal malady some time ago, all that medical skill could accomplish was of no avail, and fully resigned to God's Holy Will, she bore her sufferings cheerfully and uncomplainingly to the end.

Aged 41, just in the prime of womanhood, she had accomplished much good on earth. Whenever sickness or sorrow came, her hand and heart were opened to soothe the wounds and console the afflicted.

All who knew her esteemed her for the excellent Christian woman that she was, and her untimely death leaves a vacancy in the community and in the hearts of the people that cannot easily be filled.

In the Women's Institute she was a valued member, and her cheery presence and helping hand gave a substantial aid in all work for the good of the community. But the greatest loss is in the Home Circle, which has been broken by the loss of a loving wife and mother, and the deepest sympathy goes out to those who are left to mourn—her loving husband, four sons, Leonard, Bertram, Hubert

and Emmett, and two daughters Elwyn and Pearl, also her greatly bereaved mother, Mrs. John Goodwin, Wellington, and three brothers, Leonard, of the Customs and Excise Office, Charlottetown, Sydney and Malcolm, of Wellington.

Her funeral took place on Tuesday, Aug. 1st, at the Immaculate Conception Church and Cemetery, Rev. Urban Gillis officiating. The pall bearers were: Joseph E. McNeill, Lenis Gallant, Frank Barry, John D. Lecky, Thomas Noonan and John T. Ayers.

The funeral procession was one of the largest ever seen in Wellington and friends and acquaintances came from far and near to pay their last tribute of respect and esteem to one whom all held dear, and as the fresh clay was placed on the coffin lid many a fervent prayer was breathed, and many an eye was moist.

In the graveyard, now, she sleeps but we all realize she has awakened to Eternal Life. The prayer of all who knew her is, May she rest in peace.
