A LARGER FLEET.

Admiral Sampson in a published article advocates a large increase of the United States navy. He sees little or no need for increasing the army because the Republic is not and cannot be in any danger from the land forces of any country however great. But the Admiral argues that the United States having acquired distant possessions and become an Asiatic power, where her interests touch those of the great naval powers, a powerful fleet is necessary for the protection of her interests and in order to command respect among the nations.  
 Admiral Sampson expresses his belief in the sincere friendship of Great Britain and therefore has no fears of the greatest of naval powers. He points out that but for the fortunate creation of the so-called White Squadron a few years ago the Republic would have been unable to go to war with even so decrepit a power as Spain, and this is true. The demands of the present are an illustration of the old adage that one supply creates a new want. The White Squadron made the war with Spain possible; the war gave the Republic Porto Rico and the Philippines; these acquisitions render a first class navy imperative.  
 It has been intimated that Admiral Dewey is also of opinion that a large increase of the navy is both desirable and necessary. The national pride has been stimulated by the achievements of the fleets at Manila and Santiago, in fact the lustre of victory shone much brighter on the ships than on the land forces in the war with Spain. The nation is rich and well able to build and equip a navy second only to that of Britain. It is therefore easy to see what will be the course of events nor will Britain or Canada regret the development. Anglo Saxon prestige would be increased if the two great English-speaking countries should develop a sea power sufficient to give security against any possible combination of hostile forces on the ocean.

Premier Waldeck-Rousseau is 53 years of age, and a prominent member of the Paris bar. Twenty years ago he was first elected to the Chamber of Deputies, and after ten years service in that body retired from political life for five years. In 1894 he was elected to the Senate.

Zola says that the innocence of Dreyfus is now recognised, but the solution of the whole affair may not be reached before the end of the summer. When all is over he will write a novel on the Dreyfus affair giving an interior view of many matters connected with it which have never been disclosed.

Probably the majority of newspaper readers look upon the modern doctrine of Christian Science as an

absurd delusion, and we read of occasional prosecutions in England and the United States against the Scientists where one of their patients dies under the treatment. There have been demands also for more stringent legislation against them. In the meantime the Boston Herald tells that the Christian Scientists are increasing in numbers, building churches in various parts of the country and erecting a magnificent marble edifice in New York City. There appears to be no lack of wealth among them. A little persecution might make of the Christian Scientists a very formidable body.

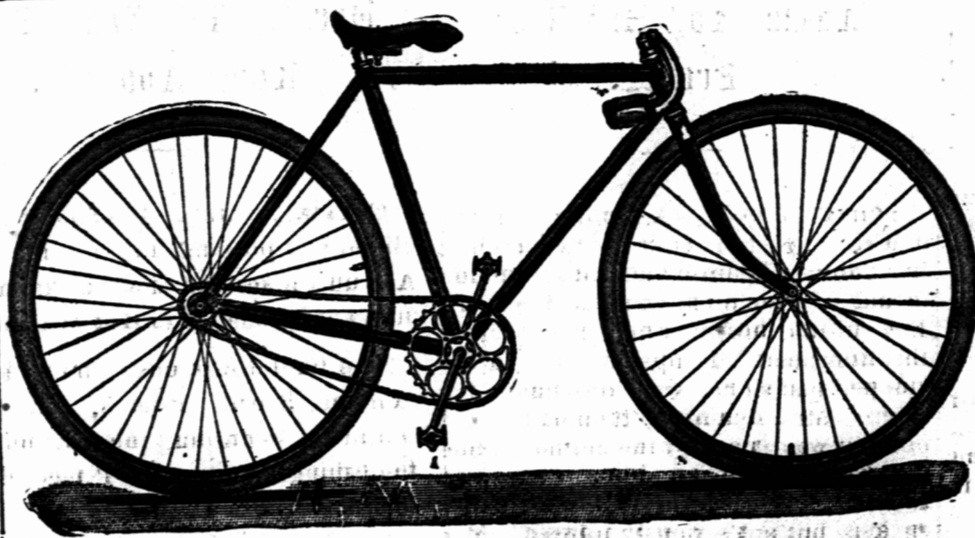
