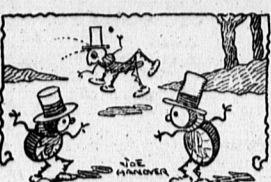

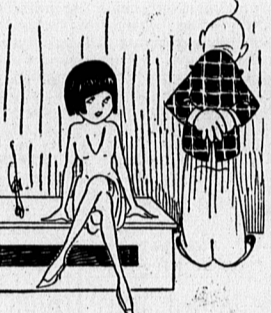

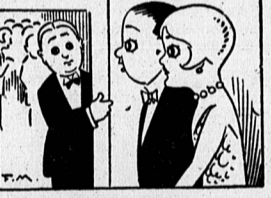

as oil gets the upper walls when needed. In the best design, this plan can be improved, however, by the addition of a device to inject raw oil for starting.

"After an engine has been standing there are no oily vapors in the crankcase, and thus nothing to be drawn into the cylinders by way of lubrication. An injection of oil is the only answer to this problem."

Smith interrupted to ask whether it is not true that the pistons hold a certain amount of oil above them.

"They do if they are made of cast iron," I explained. "But aluminum alloy pistons are coming into vogue and they contract more when cold. An engine with such pistons has fairly dry cylinder walls after standing several days."

So motor design goes in circles—now ahead, now around again. And back once more to the old idea of putting oil in the gas, but or a more modern plane.

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
