Launch Drive For Higher Wages

(By The Canadian Press) HALIFAX, Aug. 5.—A drive for higher wages in Maritime shipyards was being launched by the Maritime Marine Workers' Federation, J. K. Baker, secretary-treasurer, said today.

Baker said his organization determined to make the move upon receipt of information that Canadian west coast shipyards and their employees were making a joint application to the National War Labor Board for a 15-cent-an-hour wage increase, a 40-hour week and other concessions.

He said that at present eastern workers were being paid 5-10 cents an hour less than west coast workers.

The official said the drive affecting workers in Halifax, Dartmouth, Pictou, Meteghan and Sydney in Nova Scotia, and at St. John, N. B., would begin with immediate meetings of the various shipyard union locals.

Annual Meeting Shareholders Of Island Foods Inc.

In a report delivered at the annual meeting of the shareholders of Island Foods Inc., yesterday, Mr. Austin A. Scates, president of the company, said that even if contracts could be secured for dehydrated potatoes they were prevented from operating due to a ruling of the Summerside Water and Sewage Commission.

The meeting was held in the office of the company dehydrator plant in Summerside and there was a 95 per cent attendance. Mr. Scates explained that when the decision to build in Summerside had been made the town had agreed to supply the plant with a suitable sewage system and maintain it.

He then read a letter which had been recently received from the commission in which the company were forbidden to make use of the sewage system to dispose of the waste products Mr. Scates said that up until this letter had been received efforts were being made to obtain the contracts for the coming season.

The meeting expressed disappointment at the situation. It was felt that this meant that under the conditions specified it would be impossible to dehydrate potatoes at the present location of the plant.

Reporting on the activities of the past year, Mr. Scates said that the quantity dehydrated was not quite up to the previous year due to a five-weeks layoff of the plant during the winter.

CANADA'S CARE OF CANNED COMMODITIES

Canada has one of the best grading methods of canned products, said H. C. Aitken, Food Technologist, Horticultural Division, Experimental Farms Service, Dominion Department of Agriculture, in the course of a recent address on fruit and vegetable canning.

The highest grade is Fancy, Choice, second and standard. Sub-standard refers to products which are fit for food, but below standard quality and cannot be sold through retail outlets.

Each label on canned fruits and vegetables must be authorized by the Canning Division, Marketing Service, Dominion Department of Agriculture. This is a protection to the consumer against misrepresentation.

Each factory is visited regularly by inspectors to ensure that sanitary conditions prevail, and the inspectors have the power to close down a plant, or place under detention any product if conditions are not satisfactory.

The Fruit and Vegetable Processing Industry and its connected government agencies are continuously striving to improve Canada's canned food, while bringing them within the reach of all income groups.

Progress is being facilitated further by the fact that in recent years food investigation has become recognized as a truly scientific field rather than something that was left strictly to workers in the nation's kitchens.

Scientifically trained men and women are now being attracted to the relatively new field called "Food Technology," and much advantage to all concerned will be the result.

HEADMASTER SAYS 'CLUBS DANGEROUS'

WOODFORD, Essex, England, Aug. 7.—(CP)—Youth clubs can be a "serious menace" to schools because they distract children from interest in school work, Sydney Adams, headmaster of Bancroft Grammar School, said here.

"Youth work is dangerous, not only because it absorbs time but it distracts the mind from what should be its main task—work," he said.

Flying Doctor Aids Stranded Royalty

SYDNEY, Australia, Aug. 6.—(CP)—An airplane used by Allan Vickers, one of Queensland State's flying doctors, flew the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester out from the interior of the state when their own plane was held up by mechanical trouble.

The doctor's machine interrupted its flight to the assistance of the Governor-General and the Duchess to carry an aged patient from his remote home to a hospital.

SALVATION ARMY BACK IN GERMANY
