"In the midst of life we are in death." A solemn Mass of Requiem for his repose of his soul was offered up after which they wended their way to the adjoining cemetery where the last sad rites were performed and all that was mortal of one whose name will not be forgotten. It is sad to rest to await the Resurrection morn. To his heart broken wife, and little daughter, also his father, sisters and brothers the wide spread sympathy of the community goes forth in their hour of sorrow. ## SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON CHURCH SERVICES

### SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON.

December 17, 1916.

#### THE HOLY CITY.

(Rev. 21:1-4.)  
Golden Text:—"Behold the tabernacle of God is with men, and he will dwell with them, and they shall be his people."—Revelation 21:3, 4.

It is the distinguishing mark of the prophet that he discerns the presence and power of God in spite of moral and spiritual darkness all around him. In fact the deeper the darkness the higher is his vision of God's plan. The seer of the Book of Revelation was writing at a time when from this point of view things were in a very desperate condition. A deep darkness had settled upon the face of the earth. But he is not appalled nor discouraged, because he looks up and in to the darkness he sees the city of God, the New Jerusalem, descending. In some respects our days furnish a parallel to his. A thick darkness has fallen upon the world in the form of a terrific struggle among the best and in all respects the most advanced nations of the phetic vision to see that the end of this earth. Does it not require truly pro-darkness will be the dawn of an era of light transcending any light that has as yet flooded the world?

When John saw the Holy City coming down from heaven Nero was on the throne, the Christians were facing extermination, moral life was at the lowest ebb, and the "Scarlet Woman" (Pagan Rome) was safely seated on the seven hills. Yet the Holy City was ready to descend to earth. So Christians ought to see Eternal Peace all ready to settle down upon the nations of the earth even in the time of the most ferocious play of warlike passions.

Chapter 21, verses 1-4. In his description of the vision of the Holy City the seer begins by naming its connection with the complete renewal of the world. It is a part of the new heavens and the new earth. A holy city inserted into an old and unholy world would no doubt be the source of much wholesome influence towards purifying, sanctifying and idealizing the world. But it would be subject to attack on the part of the evil forces that had caused the world to degenerate. It might suffer something in its struggle against the evils that might even be stained and polluted by the touch of the old. But the Holy City which is a part of the new heavens and the new earth is above and beyond any of the evils that could mar it. Thus the vision strengthens the Christian's confidence that a time is coming when the old evils shall utterly lose their power to affect God's new institutions.

Secondly, the Holy City is seen as descending from heaven. It is not a structure to be built upon earth from earthly materials. Yet it is meant to be the home of those who live upon earth. Heaven and earth are not separated from one another by an impassable gulf. Heaven is to furnish the residents of the home in the ideal order of things. The name of the Holy City associates it with that beloved center and source of all holy influences under the old Jerusalem, which was often polluted and destroyed by its enemies, it is to remain safe and immune forever. For it is to be the object of Christ's love even as a bride is the object of her husband's love.

Furthermore, the coming down of the Holy City is significant of a most wonderful transformation of relations between God and men. Behold the tabernacle of God is with men. In a sense God is never absent from the world of men. He is amongst them and in them always. But as they come to realize His presence it becomes true that he comes into their midst and dwells with them. Their lives are affected very much as the lives of plain citizens of any portion of a realm would be if the king of that realm were to decide to build for himself a home among their own humble cottages and to take his abode among them. They would not only rejoice and be proud at the few intimacies, but they would conform their whole conduct to it, living more worthy of the dignity bestowed on them.

Verses 3-4. To the seer's mind the Holy City presents a most fascinating spectacle. It attracts him by its beauty. "Her light was like the light, unto a stone most precious." It attracts him by its associations. The names of the twelve tribes of Israel and the twelve apostles were commemorated upon its gates and upon its foundation stones to remind men of the sacred ties that bound the people of God together. The real Holy City is of course, not a material building, but a spiritual community, and those who make it up are associated with the faithful patriarchs and apostles. Jesus Christ himself being its corner stone.

Verses 22-27. One feature of the Holy City must have surprised the seer as it surpasses all that he had realized. It is the fact that there was one temple in it. A city without a church sounds strangely anomalous in the Christian ideal. Yet it is more anomalous than a community without a government or laws. Both are the objects of every praiseworthy aspiration and effort. Those who labor so to train the citizenry of a country into laws without being conscious that there are laws to be obeyed, are moving towards the ideal state. So the Christian who looks forward to the state of things which will make churches unnecessary because every soul feels the presence of God and worships him everywhere, are working towards making the Holy City a reality. Neither sin nor darkness have any place in such a city.

Chapter 22:1-5. The culminating item in the description of the Holy City is that God Himself is source of its life. This is pictured in a symbolical figure derived from Ezekiel. Just as the Old Testament prophet had seen a river of the throne of God, so the seer of the Book of Revelation described a river of water of life issuing from under the throne of God, and God is the source of all life, but especially of eternal life. The tree of life lost in Eden is to be rediscovered (never a gain to be lost) in the Holy City.
