

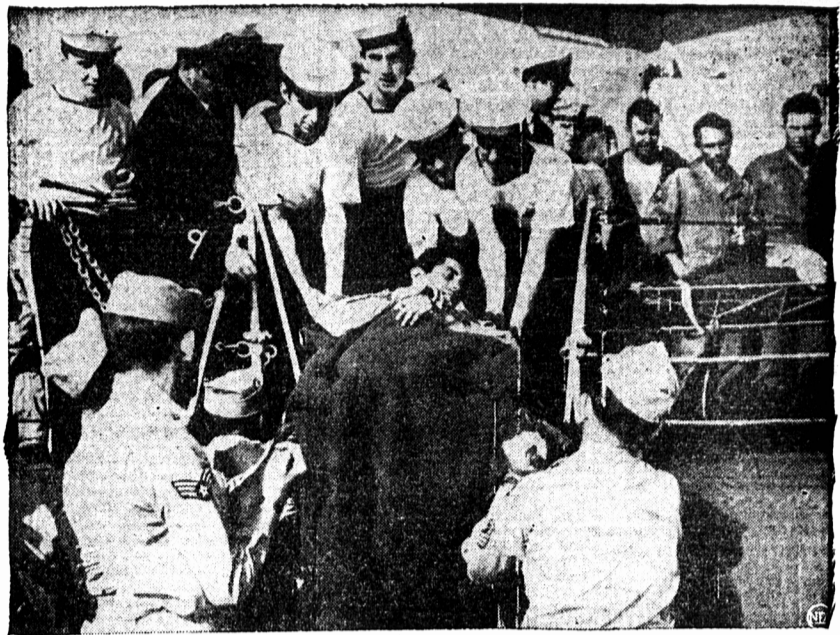

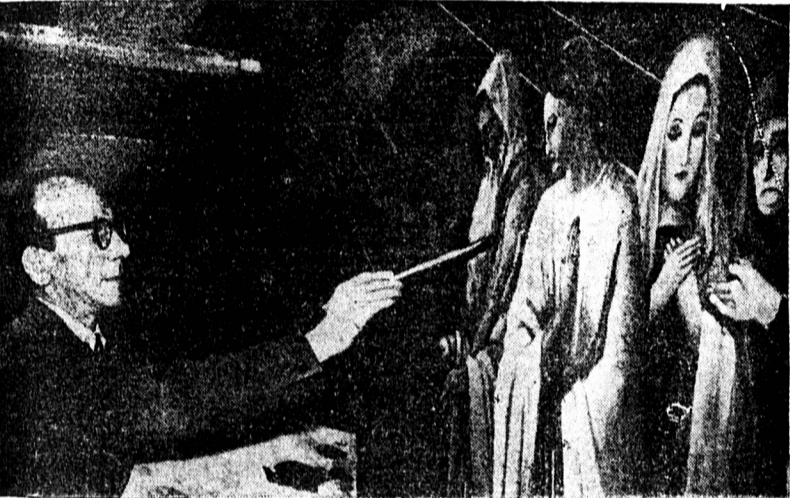

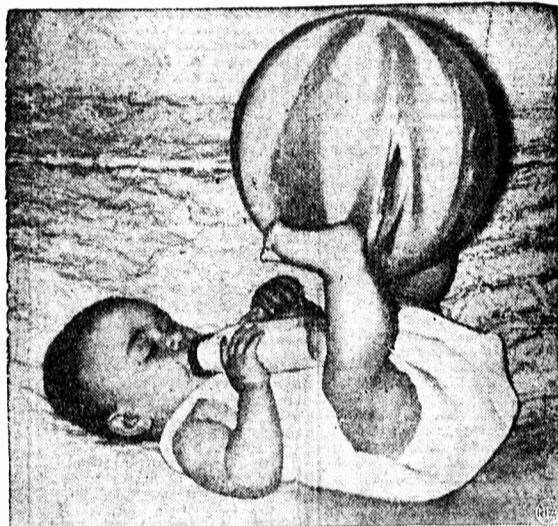

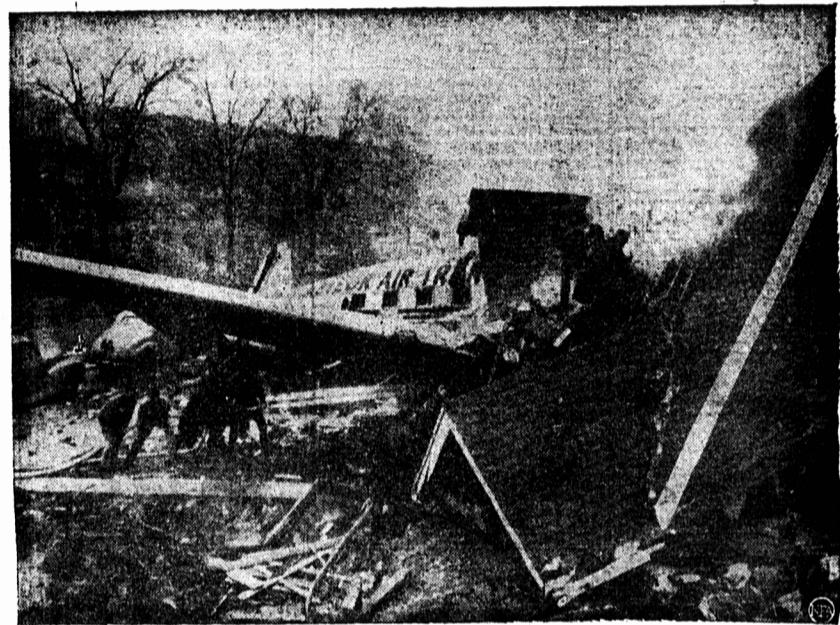

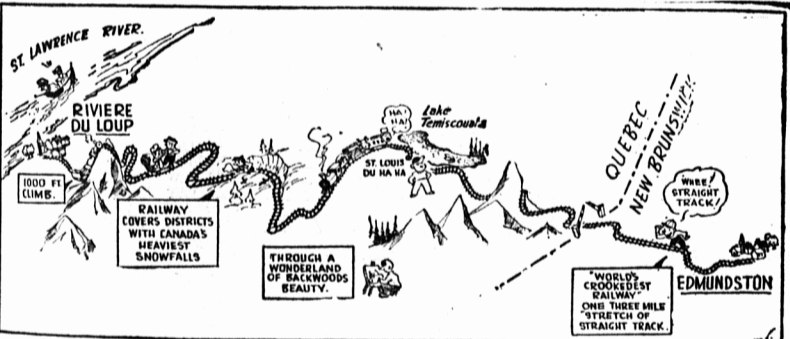
Ukrainian artist Edward Kozak, one of Europe's greatest muralists and caricaturists, was found toiling as a street cleaner in Hamtramck, a Detroit suburb. Before the war, Kozak won many honors for his murals, but he was better known for his caricatures and political cartoons. A widely-reproduced caricature of Stalin brought the wrath of Soviet agents, and Kozak became a hunted man. Located by a Detroit architect decorator, Kozak was given a job painting murals and now his work is winning acclaim in Detroit. But, says Kozak: "Even if I have to sweep streets, I would be happy if I can remain in the United States."

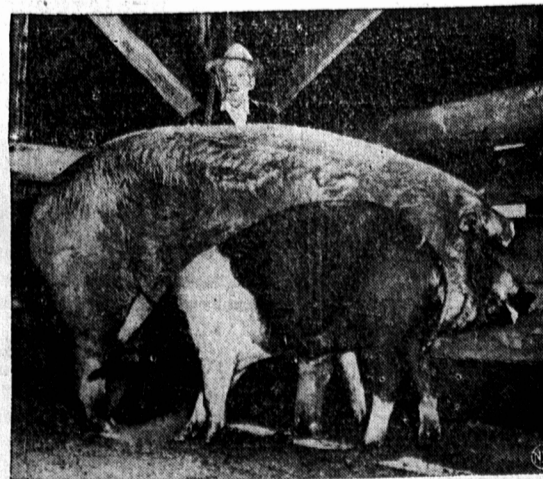

PONDEROUS PORKER — There's 500 pounds of sausage — nearly a third of a mile of links — wrapped up in this high hog brought to the Chicago market by Robert Hawley of Argyle, Wis. The four-year-old Duroc boar is four feet high, six feet long and weighs 1090 pounds. Packers paid Hawley \$124.20 for the hog and sharpened up their sausage grinders. The normal-size Hampshire hog in foreground points up the monster's size.
