He has been absent from home fourteen years and has travelled considerably in foreign countries including South Africa and the South American republics. He is at present employed in the Boston and Maine railroad shops in Portsmouth, New Hampshire.

Two fast passenger steamers will run next summer between Montreal and New foundland, making calls at Prince Edward Island and Cape Breton. The first of these steamers will be on the route on the opening of navigation and the sister ship as soon after as completed. The steamers will possess qualities that contribute to the comfort of passengers, first, second and stowage, and are to have a sea speed of 18 knots. These vessels will be twin screw, with Harfield's steering gear, and balanced according to the Yarrow-Schlick principle.

A Sydney exchange says: Just at present the supply of potatoes and oats in North Sydney and Sydney Mines is quite limited, and as a result prices for these commodities are almost prohibitive. The presence of the P. E. Island schooner Aurora in port, however, with a cargo of 180 bushels of white oats, 100 bushels of turnips, and 800 bus. of potatoes, beside other roots, caused many householders to breathe easy. The Aurora's cargo of oats were sold en bloc for 55 cents per bushel, turnips 32 c. s., and potatoes 40 cents, a quantity of Island apples brought 85 cents per bushel by the crate and \$100 by single bushel.
