Canadian Music

Is Of Great Age

Juliet Gaultier De La Verendraye Demonstrates In Montreal The Rich And Varied Treasure Which Belongs To Canada.

MONTREAL, Oct. 30.—(By The Canadian Press)—That Canada has a rich and diversified musical heritage of which she may well be proud was demonstrated by Juliet Gaultier de la Verendraye, who recently gave a programme which was notable not only for the charm with which it was sung and staged, but for the contrast afforded. This programme was heard by the Montreal Women's Club.

The singer herself presented a striking picture, garbed for her opening numbers in the fur costume of a medicine woman of the Copper Eskimos, with the sacred dance cap topped by a loon's beak credited with power to exorcise evil spirits. Next, for her songs of the British Columbia Indians, she wore a magnificent dress, consisting of a black cloak ornate with red figures such as are seen on totem poles, a red shirt with black bands, with tiny bells on the fringe, and a fringed bodice. With this she wore a wide-brimmed Indian hat. In her last group of songs, Miss Gaultier appeared in Acadian costume, consisting of a bright red dress, with the traditional "tablier noir" and black scarf. All her costumes were admirably set off by her rich coloring and black hair.

Introducing the songs of the Northern Alaska and Copper Eskimos, Miss Gaultier told her audience that their music was almost as old as that of the Chinese, and that some of the songs were made as long as 10,000 years ago.

Of particular appeal to the audience were the Acadian and French Canadian songs, which Miss Gaultier accompanied on a zither, seated at a table. In connection with a French religious vaudeville song of the twelfth century, "La Sainte Vierge aux Longs Cheveux Pendants," Miss Gaultier told her audience that during her recent visit to Nova Scotia she collected no less than 300 songs, and there traced the origin of many of the French-Canadian songs of Quebec, also making an entire collection of "miracle" songs of St. Nicholas, the legends coming down from the fourth century and the

The other day I listened with close attention to a discussion between three men (which developed with a debate) respecting the disparity between the mental powers of men. On one side it was contended that a few men stood so high above their fellows that they might fully be called supermen. Against this view it was held that all minds are alike in a very marked degree, that in all men there is the faculty of poetry, of sculptor of mathematics of philosophy and the difference is only of degree. One man had a better memory than another because it was better trained and exercised not because it was so much better—by nature another wrote better poetry or made better speeches because of more practice, in fact that all men could shine if they took pains in any department of the mind and the same even with physical strength it being pointed out that a great many strong men had like the late president Roosevelt been feeble and delicate in youth but had by diligent exercise and training become athletic. One cited the case of Right Hon Philip Snowden chancellor of the Exchequer, saying that he had not on account of his illness had plenty of time to study he never would have been heard of. On the other side it was maintained that only the man of average ability could not by all the diligence and application in the world ever become a great poet painter sculptor or scientist. That he was born with certain limitations and within these limitations he was destined to remain. In this spirited debate, the names of Shakespeare Bacon Aristotle Milton Darwin, Huxley and others were bandied about like a shuttlecock in the game of battledore. At the end of the discussion neither side seemed gained very much advantage but as a listener I recalled to my self the Latin proverb: out of nothing, nothing, comes.—H

Household Hints

Black Silk

To clean black silk, brush and wipe it well, lay on a flat table, right side up, and sponge with hot coffee which has been strained through muslin. Iron when partly dry. Black silk can also be cleaned by sponging the dirty spots with water in which potatoes have been boiled.

Hard Sauce

To make a hard sauce, cream a third of a cupful of butter and confectioners sugar. Add a half teaspoonful of vanilla extract, and if desired a few drops of sherry flavoring.

Warts

To remove warts, dip a toothpick in nitric acid and touch the wart not oftener than once every two days. Great care should be taken not to touch the surrounding flesh.
