BUSY DAY FOR TRANS-OCEAN FLYERS

Trans-Atlantic aviators are busy today, but their followers were anxious tonight because only one of the three planes which took the air had made a safe landing at its refueling point.

The Hutchinsons George Hutchinson and his crew of seven including a wife and two small daughters came down at Saint John, N. B., from New York.

Thor Solberg and Carl Petersen, who left New York for Oslo and Clyde Lee with John Bouchkon, bound for the same point from Barre, Vermont, were hours overdue at Harbor Grace, Nfld., their refueling point, where fog and darkness made the chances of a safe landing remote.

Captain J. A. Mollison, a successful westward crossing in a moth plane behind him, waited at New York for weather favorable to a return flight.

Ulrich, Oiscull and Newcomer William Ulrich, Dr. Leon Oiscull and Edna Newcomer planned to hop for Rome from New York tomorrow if conditions were right.

Von Gronau Captain Wolfgang Von Gronau, German flyer on a projected round-the-world trip, was unreported tonight seven hours after he took off with three companions for Cordova, 425 miles away.

Denmark Adopts Sweeping Free Trade Policy

One Of The Most Important Free Markets Of Europe Will Be Opened On Sept. 1st — Canadian Business Men After As Large A Portion As Possible Of This Market.

MONTREAL, Aug. 23.—(By The Canadian Press)—Adoption by Denmark on September 1 of a sweeping free trade policy was announced today by the Montreal Board of Trade on the basis of "authoritative" information.

All cattle, fodder, coffee, rice, raw tobacco, seeds and fruits for oil-pressing purposes, pig-iron and raw metals would be admitted free to Denmark under the new policy, thus creating one of the most important free markets in Europe.

Bank Hold - Up Frustrated At Shubenacadie

OTTAWA, Aug. 23.—(By The Canadian Press)—Canada and Newfoundland have reached a tentative understanding on which a trade agreement between the two Dominions will be built up, it was learned here tonight.

PLANS FOR OCEAN HOP INTERRUPTED

Police Arrest Young Aviator Who Is Alleged To Have Stolen Plane In Which He Hoped To Fly To Dublin.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 23.—(By The Canadian Press)—Plans for a trans Atlantic flight were nipped in the bud today when police arrested Peter Ordinal, young Winnipeg aviator who is alleged to have stolen a hydroplane in which he hoped to fly to Ireland and win fame and fortune.

The plane, said to have been stolen from its moorings in the Red River, Aug. 18, was recovered a few days later, abandoned and damaged to the extent of about \$500.

Fear Felt For Safety Of Trans Atlantic Flyers

Two Planes Reported Overdue, While The "Flying Hutchinsons" Landed At St. John, N. B.—Planes Sighted Yesterday Evening Over Maritime Provinces.

HARBOR GRACE, Nfld., Aug. 23.—(By The Canadian Press)—Newfoundland's summer midnight—9:30 Eastern Standard Time—found this airport on the western shore of Conception Bay blazing with flares for the guidance of flyers who did not come.

At 9:30 the most recent reports had been from Hermitage, 120 miles or so from Harbor Grace, where a plane was sighted at 5:26 E. S. T., and from Bay L'Argent, 40 miles nearer the field, where an unidentified flyer going east was reported at 6:20 E. S. T. Whether

Oslo, Norway, and London, England, were the points of destination which the venturesome flyers hoped to reach after their flight over the hazardous uncharted sky trails. All three planes plan to take off tomorrow in continuation of the trips.
