OUR GRAVES IN FRANCE.

(From the Dublin Times, June 6, 1919)

The Press Association's Special Correspondent at Paris telegraphed on June 10—There are in England thousands of mothers, sisters and widows of those killed in the war who find it difficult to understand why, six months after the conclusion of the armistice, facilities are still refused for visits to the graves of their dear ones in France. In this country, where the people have to a much greater extent brought into close contact with the horrors of war and their sequels, the situation is better appreciated.

Mr. Churchill's recent statement in the House of Commons, that the bodies of 180,000 British dead, buried more or less where they fell (and a still greater number of French), are being removed from scattered graves into central cemeteries, will, doubtless, have reconciled many of those who were determined to defer their visit to next year. But the experiences of a young Englishwoman, who, with a French girl friend, and the latter's father, has just made such a visit, will show that there are many other reasons which fully justify the attitude of the authorities.

It is not only from the fields and trenches that bodies have to be removed. Many also lie buried amid the ruins, or under the debris of the towns and villages, and in some places which we passed through this was terribly evident. Some towns, like Peronne, have already been cleared in this respect. In most of the work has not even begun. Neither food nor accommodation are available, and owing to the state of the shell-pitted roads in the war area, travelling by motor car is a slow and precarious business.

Roads Pitted With Shell-Holes.

It was for these reasons that, in the hope of being able to get back the same day, instead of starting from Paris, we began our journey from a point at least a third of the distance to Peronne. As we had anticipated, the shell holes tried our car severely, and though we were lucky enough to meet with no serious accident, some long halts for repairs. The difficulties of finding shelter for the night were brought sharply home to us on one of these occasions, when an English engineer officer rode up and, on finding our plight, kindly told us that if we could not get on we had better go to "the officer in charge of the train" at Omecourt, who would put us up somehow, for it would be impossible to get a lodging anywhere else.

Peronne is a terrible sight. It is a bog town, with a cathedral in the middle, and there is not a single house left that can be called habitable, nothing but tottering walls and gaping holes. Nevertheless, a few people have returned and are living in huts built in the central square. Others are making the best of things in cellars.

After Peronne came the worst part of our journey along a rough country road, pitted all over with shell holes. It was terribly rough going, and naturally very slow. As the result of all these delays, it was evening before we reached Roisel, the goal of my pilgrimage on the Somme front, and by the time we were ready to leave again it was a quarter-past eight, and getting dark. To think of spending the night at Roisel was impossible. It is nothing but low ruins, few of them more than three feet high, and, apart from some English troops, is deserted.

A Search for Lodging at Peronne.

Monsieur R—decided to try to get back to Peronne. He drove as quickly as he dared along the bad road, but by the time Peronne came in sight, it was half-past nine and quite dark. Mercifully we had no more accidents on the way. Then began the search for lodgings. We inquired wherever we saw a light—in all, at four places, I think—but there was no room anywhere. Then we fell in with a party of roughs, half a dozen men, who would have thought nothing of knifing us for our money. However, a moment afterwards a party of Tommies came up the street. I called out to them, and they conducted us to a building that was at least half complete, where we saw an English officer, to whom I explained our case. He said he could not possibly undertake to lodge ladies, but would send his orderly with us to the French Red Cross. So we went back through the dark streets until we came to a new hut, where some French Red Cross nurses lived. The superintendent told us that she had no room at all, but we might leave the car in their yard if we liked. This was something, so the car was backed in and left there. Then the superintendent said she knew a woman who had a room at the other end of

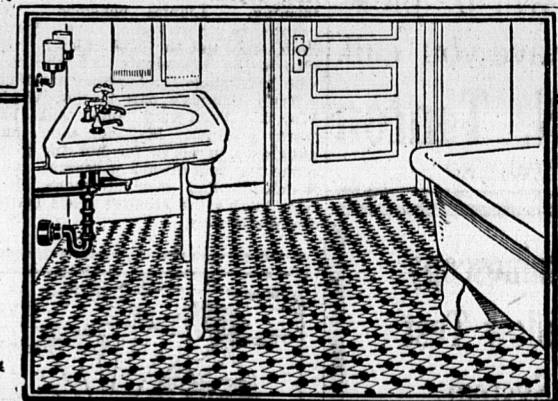

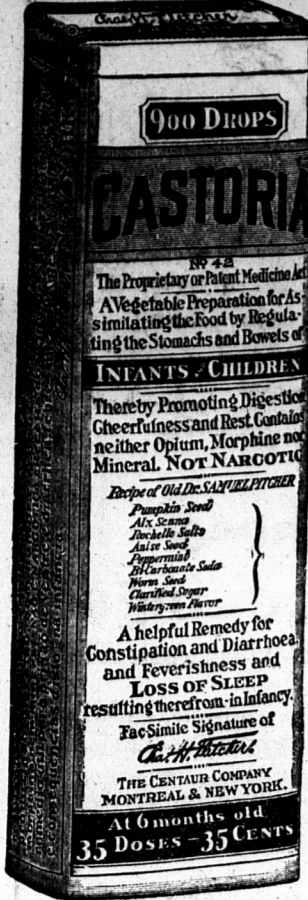

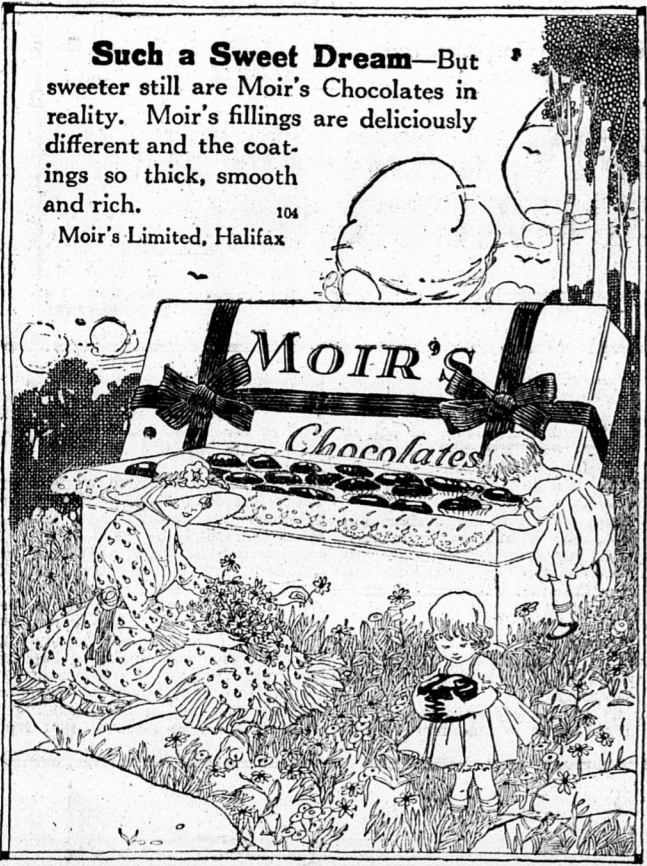
