G. T. R. KEY TAPPERS WILL GET INCREASE

MONTREAL, Mar. 12—It has been announced that the Grand Trunk Railway Company has decided to raise the wages of the telegraph operators throughout their system. The reasons given for the change, which is to come into effect immediately, is that many operators that work on Sunday have not been receiving any extra pay. In the future, additional remuneration will be given for Sunday as well as the regular salary for the other six days, and in most cases changes will result in a substantial increase in the monthly wage.

One of the largest mining deals made locally for some considerable time has just been completed between D. R. Bell and Joe Davis of this city and E. L. Morgan, who represents a strong Winnipeg syndicate of mining investors and operators. The deal, which involves a consideration of \$125,000, transfers six valuable copper-gold claims one and a half miles from Lockport on the Queen Charlotte Islands to the syndicate represented by Mr. Morgan. The claims are situated at an altitude of 3,000 feet, and the vein they include is 120 feet wide. The ore is of the same quality as that being handled at Goose Bay, and as development proceeds on the claims will probably be sent for smelting to Goose Bay, when the smelter is erected there. Mr. Bell and Mr. Davis, who is a brother of Miss Grace Davis of the Government office staff, have held these six claims for four years, resisting several tempting offers to part with them. Mr. Morgan, on behalf of the Winnipeg syndicate, states that in May development work will be commenced on a force of 25 men. With Messrs. Bell and Davis he visited the claims in the launch Ocean Bell—Winnipeg Exc.—Mr. Bell referred to is a son of the late George Bell, Stanley Bridge.

MATCH CHEWING PROVES FATAL

CAMDEN, N. J., March 12.—Charles Shea is dead in Cooper Hospital from chronic phosphorus poisoning. He had been for years a chewer of match sticks. As other men chew tobacco or gum he chewed the little wood splinters after breaking off the heads. The phosphorus absorbed by the wood almost too small to be measured, but long-continued practice of the habit introduced so much into Mr. Shea's system that two weeks ago he fell fatally ill.

INCREASE FOR AGRICULTURE.

The Ontario Government is again this year increasing its annual Budget for Agriculture. In connection with the O. A. College \$5,000 has been appropriated for a new dining hall and \$1,000 for a new Dairy stables, \$16,500 for the purchase of additional land and \$10,000 for an electric plant. \$6,000 is also appropriated for Demonstration Farms in Northern Ontario. \$16,200 for Agricultural and Horticultural Societies and \$8,000 for additional representation. Last year the Dept. of Agriculture of Ontario spent almost twice as much for Agriculture as the Dominion Dept. of Agriculture and their increased appropriations this year would tend to show that they will plan to keep Agriculture in the very front.

TURNT STATE'S EVIDENCE.

NEW YORK, March 16—Joss Al-bronza, one of the five bandits who took part in the sensational \$25,000 taxicab robbery at Church Street on February 15th, turned states evidence today in the criminal branch of the Supreme Court against Ceno Montali, the chauffeur and owner of the taxicab in which the hold-up took place. He said:—"The next day I saw Joe Kid and went to get the key of the back room saloon. Then saw Secoy who came from Boker St. on the other side of the street. I saw the rest of the fellows coming or the run. He had a satchel and went into a back room. There was one bundle of tens and three of five. Then Abano grabbed the nearest bundle of \$10,000."
