Kitty McKane, Lusty Frisco And Bud Cope Capture Races At Summerside

Fair weather with a cool north breeze greeted the spectators at the annual Dominion Day races held at the Summerside Driving Club yesterday. Many horsemen express the opinion that the programme was not quite up to the standard of other years but never-the-less a fine day's sport was enjoyed by the large and enthusiastic crowd.

2.15 TROT
The 2.15 trot was won handily by Lusty Frisco, 2:07 1-4 in straight heats. The Frisco horse, driven by Tom Holmes was never in danger after Helen D. made a disastrous break in the first heat, and showed good form in winning the third heat in 2:15 with the fastest time of the meet. In the first heat Helen D. drew the pole but made a break and Lusty Frisco went to the front with Capt. Cope second. Helen D. came back strong and nipped Capt. Cope at the wire with Lusty Frisco first in 2:16 1-2. The trotters got away on the second score in the second heat. Mac Steele was forcing Helen D. and it seemed as though she would take the lead when she again made a break and came back to last position. After Mac got his mare back on the trot she trotted a storm and finished about a length behind Lusty Frisco with Capt. Cope third. The third heat was the fastest of the day. Helen D. made a gallant attempt to head Frisco but the previous two heats told on her and Holmes piloted his horse to the wire an easy winner.

2.23 TROT AND PACE
This class had four starters and was the hardest class of the day to get away. Silver Doctor and Kitty McKane being the worst offenders. After several scores they got away for the first heat with Kitty McKane at the pole. Fred Ross handled the little mare beautifully and she was never headed. Claire Napoleon showed more speed than the other horses of this class but could not pace the sharp turns and made bad breaks in every heat. Coming into the stretch Enzor Bowness pulled out Silver Doctor to try and beat Kitty McKane at the wire but he made a break and dropped back to fourth position. In the second heat there was practically a repetition of the first with Claire Napoleon again making a bid for the lead but Silver Doctor broke again and fell back. Kitty McKane seemed to have the third heat sewed up also when Enzor Bowness came from nowhere with Silver Doctor at the three quarter pole and nosed her out in 2:20 1-4 for the fastest heat of the race.

2.28 TROT AND PACE
This class with seven starters proved to be the best race of the day. With Rosebud at the pole they got away on the second score. Soviet with Mac Steele up made a break attempting to take the lead going up the back stretch. Claire Schurman drove a cagey heat with Happy Boy tucking in behind Rosebud for the first heat and then pulling out when Rosebud broke at the three quarter pole to win the heat. In the second heat Soviet took the lead but made a break going down the back stretch and Happy Boy who looked like a nice trotter all through the race took the lead. There was a very exciting finish to this heat as Happy Boy, Bud Cope and Balbo came into the stretch neck and neck. Happy Boy made a skip and Bud Cope slipped ahead to win the heat with Balbo second. Bud Cope deserves a lot of credit for this heat as he made a break on the first turn and had a long way to come. Balbo also made a game drive right to the wire. George Calbeck won the third heat and race with Bud Cope with Balbo fighting all the way. Pat McKenna with Rosebud got third with Happy Boy back to fourth.

Toll Gate Lowers Pacing Record at Sydney Track.

Alexander's Betty S. from Saint John provided the sensations at Sydney Trotting Park today, winning the 2:13 Trot and Pace in three straight heats and showing her heels to the great Marjorie M., owned by Richard Jabalee of North Sydney. The Sweeney stables of Bridgewater, which took all the big purses at Truro last week, cleaned up on the other races here today. Driving his own horses, H. M. Sweeney won the free-for-all with Toll Gate and the 2:14 1-2 with Capt. Bee, both in straight heats. The pacing record for the Sydney track, 2:12 3-4, made by Lambert Todd on Sept. 2, 1928, went by the boards when Toll Gate, imported from Ontario last year, went round the oval for a mile in 2:11. Having developed a nasal ailment, Hunter Hedgewood, owned by Frank Holmes, was unable to start in the free-for-all, and Patrick Direct went lame and had to be withdrawn from the 2:13 class. Betty S. and Marjorie M. were the only horses in the 2:14. The times were 2:15, 2:13 and 2:15.

CALEDONIA CLUB HOLD ANNUAL SPORTS

1600 people attended one of the best annual get-togethers of the Scottish clans held yesterday at Kinross under the auspices of the Caledonia Club and the Gaelic Community Centre. Following a march from the entrance to the grounds to the speakers stand led by the Caledonia Club Pipes, Mr. J. A. Anderson, Past Chief of the Club introduced Rev. D. M. Sinclair, Valleyfield, who delivered the speech of welcome in Gaelic. Mr. John Reid, Charlottetown, replied in Gaelic. Rev. Mr. Sinclair's address appears in the Gaelic below followed by a translation in English. A summary of Mr. Reid's reply follows. The address of welcome in English was delivered by Mr. George MacLean, Lewes and responded to by Mr. W. R. Shaw, Cornwall, President of the Caledonia Club. He referred to the desirability of the district for a Scottish gathering. The locality had been settled by people from Scotland over 100 years ago. The speaker said he felt sure best tradition of the Scottish race had been well maintained in the district. The result of the day's competitions would indicate, he felt, that descendants of the pioneers were not lacking in physical prowess. In conclusion he thanked the people of the locality for their warm welcome.
