Three young men—two at Freetown and one at Melville—were drowned over the weekend in both accidents they were fishing for trout from small boats on millponds.

The victims were: Ivan Taylor, 19, and Clarence Davison, 15, both of Freetown, drowned Saturday morning. Neil Jay, 19, of Mount Stewart, drowned Sunday afternoon. The bodies of the two from Freetown were recovered Saturday at Melville, grappling operations were unsuccessful last night and will be resumed early today. The accident at Melville—on Southern Quay in the district of Beatons Mill, a few miles from Eldon—two young men were fishing alone in a small boat when they apparently lost his balance only about 20 feet from shore. However, the water is probably 15 feet deep at the spot. It was believed he was standing up in the boat, although apparently there were no eyewitnesses of the tragedy.

He was visiting a sister, Mrs. William MacEwen at Melville and had worked a short time for the Canadian National Railway. He was a son of the late Wesley Jay of Mt. Stewart. It was not learned whether his mother is living.

Four brothers, Elmer Jay, Basil Jay, Duncan Jay and George Jay, live at or near Mount Stewart. A sister, Aemie, is in Montreal.

Palmer and Williams Co. This particular boat is built to ply shallow inland waters and is known as a tunnel launch because the propeller is housed in a tunnel for protection. The launch is 47 feet long, 13 feet wide and has a draft of only eight inches and will be used at times in very shallow water. It was constructed on order of the Dominion Government for a survey work. It is powered by a 125 h.p. diesel engine but this was taken out of her and shipped separately.

SUPREME COURT.—At an adjourned special meeting of the Supreme Court at Summerside yesterday when Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell presiding, judgments were given in three cases. In the civil case of Cahill vs. McNevin, an action for damages resulting from the plaintiff being struck by the defendant's truck on Water Street, Summerside, in December 1945, judgment was given in favor of the plaintiff for \$5,000.00 and costs. Mr. J. B. Johnson, Charlottetown, represented the plaintiff and Mr. Morley M. Bell, K.C., and Mr. Henry Noonan, represented the defendant. In the appeal case of the King (respondent), an appeal from the Crown from a dismissal by the Magistrate of a charge laid under the Excise Act, the Magistrate's decision was reversed and the respondent was convicted and sentenced to a fine of \$200.00 or three months plus \$100.00 costs. In the appeal case of John (Sonny) Gallant (appellant) vs. the King (respondent), an appeal from the Magistrate the conviction was upheld and a fine of \$150.00 or three months in jail imposed. He was also sentenced to pay \$50.00 of the costs of the respondent. Mr. C. D. MacCallum represented the Crown in both cases, and Mr. W. Henry Noonan represented the accused.

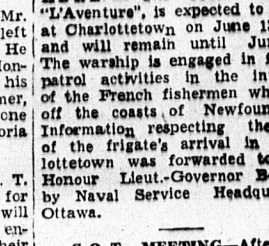
