Mr. McBride, of Winnipeg, President of the Dominion Association of Life Insurance Agents came over by the Earl Grey yesterday. He is making a tour of the Dominion in the interests of the Life Insurance Association.

The city market yesterday was fairly well attended but a very small quantity of produce was handled owing to the unfavorable condition of the roads for hauling. The prices which appear elsewhere are the same as when last quoted.

Arthur Duke, Montague, at one time employed in R. T. Holman's, Ltd., Summerside, came to the city recently and left on the Minto for Pictou en route to Wetsaskin, Alta. He was accompanied by his father who went to Plaster Rock, N. B.

The following quotations of potato prices and markets in Ontario and Western Canada will interest many here: Potatoes are firm. Deliveries have of late been firm at Montreal owing to bad roads, and prices there are firm at \$1.10 to \$1.15 per bag for Ontario, while Green Mountains are worth up to \$1.20. At Toronto there is little change, the price by car lot on track being 80c to 85c per bag. Winnipeg still quotes 70c to 75c per bushel, Edmonton 40c to 45c per bushel, and at the Pacific coast prices are still going up owing to great scarcity. At New York old potatoes are somewhat firmer, but the receipts of new potatoes are broadening. Maritime markets show little change.

There are quite a number in this city who are interested in the Codd Mining Co., of Nevada, a company operating ten gold mines, six of which are owned outright and four leased. Investors here have received notice that a splendid strike of high grade ore has been made in the Alleghans Mine, one of those owned by the Company, and great returns are expected. This mine's proceeds go directly to the shareholders, not as in the case of others of the mines, which contribute a part of their output proceeds to the further development of the mines. The miners are on the border between Nevada and California and some are located in one state and some in others. The mine adjacent to the Alleghans has been turning out a great grade of ore recently and this discovery in the latter mine has been expected for some days as indications in the nearby mine pointed to a continuance of the lead in the Alleghans. There are quite a large number of shares owned in this province and about 60,000 in the Maritime provinces, and the shareholders will, no doubt, be somewhat elated over the news.

Strenuous efforts are shortly to be made in Sydney by those interested to prevent the smoking of so many cigarettes by the boys and young men of Sydney. The matter is now being taken up by the clergy members of the medical profession, and prominent laymen, and it is understood that an anti-cigarette league is to be organized in the near future. From pulpit last Sunday Dr. Fringle, (well known here) made a strong attack on the cigarette smoking habit, which he said, was more prevalent in Sydney than in any other place he had visited. Members of the medical profession are also taking the matter up. On Sunday afternoon next, Dr. W. McK. McLeod will address the superintendents and teachers of the various Sabbath schools on the "Cigarette Evil." Posters clipped from medical journals, and from anti-cigarette papers, have been tacked up in a number of conspicuous places about the town. This is a movement similar to that of a few months ago here which was productive of such good results. It is time many other towns besides Charlottetown and Sydney became alive to the menacing danger lurking in the cheap paper rolls.

This vessel, which was but recently launched is at present the largest passenger steamer afloat and makes her maiden trip in June. The views have attracted considerable attention and show the leviathan of the sea afloat as well as views of many interior parts. Dimensions, capacity and other statistics are also appended to the photographs. The W. K. Rogers Co. Ltd., are local agents of this line.

J. H. Hamilton, Amherst, the well known Engineer has been employed by A. D. Provand and his associates of Sackville to make a survey of the ship railway line and to make an estimate of the combined steam and electric road from Port Lawrence to Tidnish and then to Northport. Mr. Hamilton began work this week. The building of this road largely depends upon the action of our local and federal governments. If subsidies are granted Mr. Provand will have the work begun at an early date. This is a work in which great interest is being taken here as, if completed, it will facilitate freight and passenger traffic on the mainland more particularly covering this province.

A Moncton Times of recent date contained the following on the death of Mrs. John Smallwood of this city whose funeral takes place here today: Mrs. W. H. Fillmore received a telegram last Wednesday from Lumsden, Sask., conveying the sad intelligence of the death of her mother, which occurred at that place on the 19th. The deceased was the widow of the late John Smallwood, of Charlottetown, leaving the latter place about five years ago to make her home with her daughter in Lumsden. Though 86 years of age she enjoyed good health up to a short time ago. On the 14th inst. she had a slight stroke of paralysis, gradually growing worse, until the end came on the 19th. She leaves a family of four—C. R. Smallwood, barrister, of Charlottetown, Mrs. John Metzger, Lumsden, Sask., Mrs. John Richards, of Vancouver, and Mrs. W. H. Fillmore, of this city. The deceased was born in England, coming to North River, P.E.I., with her parents, when a girl of four years. She will be kindly remembered by many of the older residents of Charlottetown, where she spent over 60 years of her life. The body will pass through here Monday, in order to take place at Charlottetown.

ANOTHER GERMAN

BALLOON WRECKED

BRUNSWICK, Germany, April 21—The dirigible balloon Parseval VI met with a mishap ten miles north of here today and was forced to make a rough landing. The passengers escaped injury, and the airship was not seriously damaged, though it lies partly in a swamp and will of necessity be dismantled and sent to Bitterfeld by train.

The accident happened soon after noon, and brought to an end what had promised to be a successful non-stop flight from Berlin to Amsterdam.

The airship occupied by ten persons, including two military officers of the Netherlands, rose at Berlin at 4.30 o'clock this morning and sailed away toward Amsterdam at a clip of 34 miles an hour.

Oebisfelde, Saxony, was passed over soon after 10 o'clock, the dirigible going strong despite rather strong wind currents. Between Isernhuh and Liederfe the aerial craft was flying low when she encountered a gust of wind that compelled her to slow up. At that moment the free end of the rope that dangled from the car caught in the branches of a great birch tree and gave the airship a yank that broke her equilibrium. This combined with the wind made necessary an immediate descent which was fairly well accomplished though with some strain to the dirigible and the shaking up of her passengers. A start pending repairs was out of the question and the Parseval VI will have to go to a shed for an overhauling.
