Down Saint John Maroons 7-5 To Take Round By 15-13 Score

S' Side Midgets Win From Kensington

SAINT JOHN, N. B., March 8.—(CP)—Prince of Wales College pucksters from Charlottetown won the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island junior hockey championship tonight by defeating Saint John Maroons 7-5 and taking the two-game, total-goal series 15-13 after an 8-all tie at Charlottetown last night.

The Charlottetown team will play Halifax St. Mary's Juniors for the Maritime crown.

Maroons, who trailed 6-1 at the end of the second period Monday night and then came back to earn a tie, were in the same position tonight, but did not have the steam to duplicate their performance at Charlottetown.

Taking advantage of Saint John penalties, Prince of Wales shot into a 5-0 lead in the first period and matched one Saint John goal in the second session.

The Collegians opened the third period scoring but Saint John shot back to fire four consecutive goals. For a time it seemed the Maroons might overtake their opponents who were on the defensive, but the winners held the fort. In the last minute of play Maroons whipped six forwards into the fray.

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Manitoba And B. C. Lead Curling Race; P. E. I. Wins Again

HAMILTON, March 8.—(CP)—Continued dominance of Manitoba and British Columbia, two dead-ends, a draw that curlers will talk about for a long time and a battling, little-known rink featured a thrill-packed Canadian curling championship fourth-round today.

The race between Manitoba and B. C. is likely to continue until the final round Thursday night. Ontario's rink, skipped by 68-year-old Pete Gilbert of Chatham with a won-lost 3-1 record is considered the only quartet that might upset the "dope".

Four rinks—Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, Northern Ontario and Saskatchewan—follow with a 2-2 record. New Brunswick is next with one victory and three losses while Alberta and Quebec take up the rear with four straight losses.

The next round is scheduled for tomorrow afternoon, following the Dominion Curling Association annual meeting in the morning.

Prince Edward Island, which hasn't been any shucks in the curling game in Dominion competition, bowed 18-10 to Ontario in the fourth round, but members of the east coast rink skipped by Russ Cruikshank, at least have something to boast about.

P. E. I.'s representatives in the title hunt have chalked up only 12 victories in 94 starts since 1936 when it entered the competition—and two have been scored this year.

St. Mary's Wins From Sydney 5-4

SYDNEY, N. S., March 8.—(CP)—Halifax St. Mary's, the Cinderella team in Maritime playoffs, took a solid step toward the tri-Provincial senior hockey title here tonight by outlasting the defending champion Sydney Millionaires for a 5-4 decision.

The game, first in a best-of-seven round, was played on mushy ice that was turned into a veritable pool of water in the last stages.

A paid audience of 4,137 saw St. Mary's skate to their eighth consecutive victory. At least 400 were known to have gained free admittance as Forum doorknockers and ticket takers were pressed back by a desperate 5 p.m. rush.

Second game of the series will be played here tomorrow night. The teams switch to games Friday and Saturday. A fifth, if necessary, will be played in Halifax next Monday and should the series extend past that, remainder will be played on Sydney ice.

Despite adverse ice conditions, the game was a saw-saw battle all the way. Millionaires outshot the Big Four champions 24-17 but were outmaneuvered and outplayed all down the line.

Millionaires, reputed as a back-sliding outfit, learned a lesson in such tactics. The Santamarians such back fast and gave goalie Jack Donlevy excellent protection.

Sydney defences were shaky on the other hand and three St. Mary's goals were direct products of loose checking behind the Sydney blue line. Goalkeeper Jack Gibson proved a little on the weak side in close-in spurges by St. Mary's.

Navy Defeats S' Side All Stars 5-3 In City League Semi-Final

In a wide-open, well played and rugged encounter at the Forum last night, Walter Lawlor's Navy pucksters skated to a 5-3 victory over the Summerside All Stars in the opening game of their two game, total goal series in City Hockey League, semi-final competition. The same squads will meet in the final encounter at the Forum on Thursday night.

Displaying a smoother brand of combination passing attacks, the Navy held a 2-0 lead over their opponents at the end of the first period. Shooting one goal in the second to still keep the All Stars scoreless, the Navy held a 3-0 advantage going into the third period and except for the outstanding goaltending by the Summerside net custodian Frankie Foy who really made some stellar saves, might have held a much greater lead at the end of that frame.

Coming back strong in the final canto, however, the All Stars turned the game into a real tussle in their determined bid to cut down the Navy lead. Despite the fact that they outscored the Navy 3-2, the Stars were right in there all the time banging away at the Summerside net, and again Foy was called upon to make some really startling saves to keep them at bay.

Lead by the punch line of Carver, Dowling and Sheppard, the Navy sprang to the attack early in the first period with Allie Carver netting the first goal of the game at 6:15 when he combined on a passing attack inside the blueline with Willy Sheppard, while All Stars were playing one short. Outway being off for slashing, about six minutes later Carver got his second goal in a row by picking up Bubby Dowling's pass just outside the opposing blueline to manoeuvre his way in on goal and rifle home a hard shot.

Both teams battled hard for the remainder of the period and missed some good scoring chances, but the two goalies, Davis and Foy, made some smart saves to hold off any further scoring in the period.

HAMILTON, March 8.—(CP)—The 1950 Canadian curling championship will be held at Vancouver, first time in the 20-year history of the tournament the Dominion finals have been held in British Columbia.

from a recent article in Hockey News concerning "Ace" Bailey one of the National League's all time greats: "Tryng Bailey, better known as the famous 'Ace' Bailey of the Toronto Maple Leafs (1926-34) has found that coaching a college sextet can be almost as hectic as playing with the N.H.L.

"Now in his twelfth year as mentor of University of Toronto's Varsity, the personable leader of the Blues hockey team has established an enviable record by capturing the senior intercollegiate McGill, Montreal University and Queens in the senior intercollegiate circuit, as well as with other Dominion and United States teams. Bailey's pucksters are the favourite target for all opponents.

"Irving Wallace Bailey was born in Bracebridge, Ont., on July 3rd, 1903. After a starry career in junior and senior amateur ranks, he broke into the National League in the 1927-28 season when he joined the Leafs.

"He stacked up with nine goals and three assists in that first season and then began rolling high, wide and handsome. In the next three campaigns he piled up 22, 22 and 23 goals respectively, which was no mean scoring feat back in those days. He dropped off in the next two years, although still rating as one of Toronto's most effective ice men.

"Then in the 1933-34 season came the near-tragic episode which ended his career. Heavily checked by Boston's Eddie Shore, Bailey fell to the ice, suffering a concussion which nearly proved fatal, and had the hockey world holding its breath and pulling for him until he finally recovered.

"The 45-year-old coach's greatest year in the N.H.L. was in 1931-32 when the Leafs won the Stanley Cup. 'Ace' led the N.H.L. in scoring one year. Likeable and gregarious, 'Ace' Bailey is doing what he likes best—coaching hockey and continuing his accomplishments in his adopted City of Toronto."

Hockey Player Is Suspended 5 Years

TORONTO, March 8.—Pierre Cadieux, star winger of Stratford Kroehlers junior club, was suspended for five years by an Ontario Hockey Association sub-committee today for playing junior while over age.

The Stratford club which was eliminated in O.H.A. play-offs by Toronto Marlboros was absolved of any participation in the infraction by the former Montreal Royals player. Evidence before the sub-committee was that Cadieux played for two seasons while over age.

Officials said Cadieux used a birth certificate which belonged to a member of another family of the same name in Valleyfield, Que. The player did not appear before the sub-committee.

Cadieux was given 30 days in which to make an appeal. First doubt as to Cadieux's eligibility came from the Quebec Hockey Association which claimed to hold a certificate showing the player was born in 1926. The certificate he filed with the O. H. A. gave 1929 as the year of his birth.
