THERE were 25 passengers to Orwell and Belfast by the S. S. City of London yesterday afternoon. The return cargo consisted of 20 tubs butter, 10 cases eggs and 3 dressed hogs.

YESTERDAY afternoon Martin Welsh, who is employed in the carpenter shop, had the misfortune to fracture a rib. The injury, his friends will be glad to learn, is not of a very serious nature.

THE house owned by Roland Moore, on the corner of Richmond and Grafton streets, was offered at auction yesterday, but as the bids made did not approach the reserve placed upon it, it was not sold.

THE cargo of the Northumberland yesterday to Pictou included a car of pork shipped by R. E. Match & Co., and the Empress took over from Summerside to Pt. du Chene yesterday 5 carloads of sheep and lambs. Two of these cars came from Souris, two from Mt. Allison and one from Pictou.

A MEETING of the Women's Council was held in the City Council Chamber Tuesday morning at which the sum of \$30 was voted for the sufferers by the late fire in Summerside. The subject of the Public Library was considered and it was decided to appoint a committee to work up an interest in that institution. Regret for the approaching departure from the city of Mrs. C. C. Gardiner was embodied in a resolution which was endorsed by every member present speaking thereto in terms of warm appreciation of her good work in the Council. Mrs. Gardiner made an appropriate and feeling reply.

THERE arrived last night from Pictou in charge of Ed Saunders, who went over to take charge of the shipment, a carload of cattle from Ontario bought in the Toronto meat market by Saunders & Newsom of this city. This firm have found it impossible at this season to procure on the Island the kind of fat cattle demanded by their trade, and have been compelled to make this experiment of buying beef cattle in Toronto. The carload comprises twenty splendid head, averaging 120 lbs, and the enterprise of the importers is to be noted. On the day these cattle were bought at Toronto, there were 130 car loads of cattle on the market.

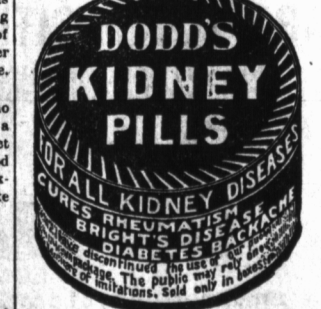
