consolidation before a single shot had been fired.

Major Gordon Logan of North Sydney, N.S., and Tony McLaughlin of Great Village, N.S., led assaulting companies from Nova Scotia Highland Regiment while Maj. Sammy Ridge of Millbrook, Ont., led a company against the Western Ontario regiment to which Maj. Cole's company belonged.

Cole's men gained their foothold just south of the bridgehead.

The bridgehead was first established. Other Western Ontario companies under Maj. Andy Beckington of St. Mary's and Capt. E. E. Young of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police cleared the riverside villages of Villanova and Borgo Di Villanova, about seven miles northwest of the bridgehead.

The Maritimers, meantime, consolidated to the rear of Saint John, N.B., struck through a road junction 1,000 yards northwest.

Sappers started in where a bridge site and three miles up stream a second bridgehead operation was launched an hour after the first.

Participating were companies from another Nova Scotia Battalion under Maj. Gordie McNeill of Cape Breton, those from a New Brunswick regiment under Major Rowland Horsey of Chatham, N.B., and Highlander companies under Captains George Best and Bill Leitch of Toronto.

Horsey transferred his men to boats from a pontoon structure which had floated down stream, and the dike and swept down the far side against light resistance.

The enemy retired in confusion, leaving 50 prisoners to Watling's men who pushed inland from their own crossing place.

A shallow, 600-yard bridgehead was secured. The Highlanders ultimately used boats to cross and took 25 prisoners, including a company commander.

The bridgehead force was augmented when troops under Capt. Harold McCune, Borden, and Bob Murdoch of Toronto crossed. Although the bridgehead's flanks were established then, the centre had not fully materialized but this was remedied when the Nova Scotians moved to the right, using their own crossing place as the New Brunwickers.

The battle had been won. A cost of half the casualties suffered in last week's setback at the same place. Considering the number of Canadian troops involved, their losses were a fraction.

Toronto infantry along with companies of a motor battalion commanded by British Columbia officers and French-speaking troops shared in the fighting to expand the bridgehead.

The Toronto troops contributed much to the enlargement of the northern foothold established south of Highway 16 while the French-Canadian had the job of making the southern foothold larger.
