General Tsai Ting-Kai

CHINESE HERO RETURNS HOME AFTER VOLUNTARY 'EXILE'
General Tsai Ting-Kai, the tall Chinese general who gained international fame when his nineteenth route army stubbornly refused to retreat before the Japanese invaders at Shanghai in 1932. Is sailing for home, bringing to a close his "exile" trip around the world. When the nineteenth army had to withdraw, General Tsai went south again to Canton, and with other idealistic patriots who yearn for Chinese unification, proffered his military abilities to Nanking, but they were not accepted. Later he joined with the province of Fukien in its effort to establish its independence from pro-Japanese Nanking, but was again defeated. Tsai was then "invited" to take a trip around the world, for he was too popular for Nanking to dispose of. Now he is on his way back home and his return is enshrouded in doubt. But he hopes to unite the Chinese Republic and drive out the Japanese.
