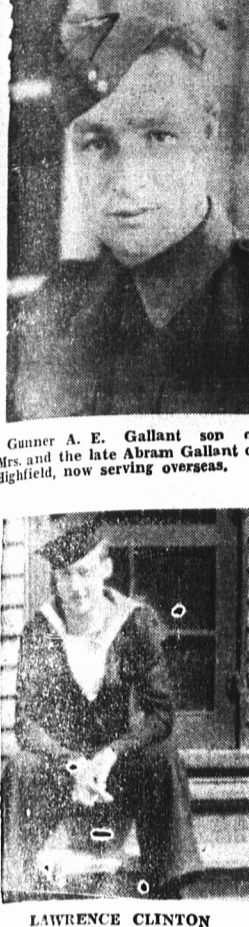

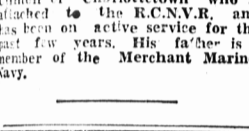

these orphaned missions by churches in China, Burma, India, Ceylon, New Zealand, Samoa, Australia, Britain, Central and South Africa, parts of South America and the United States and Canada. "The missionary work of the church is one, whether its immediate concern be for the neighbor, our fellow countryman, the people in the frontier areas in our North and West, or people on the other side of the world," the General Secretary told the board.

Rev. H. G. Watts, field secretary for the M. S. C. C., told of the need for workers among the non-Anglo-Saxon people of Canada. He also pointed out that there is a most urgent need for men for parochial and missionary work in general. "Ours is a Missionary Church. Wherever one goes from the fishing villages in Nova Scotia to the shacks of the beachcombers among the British Columbia Coast, one never more than a few minutes from a missionary opportunity."

"It is a matter of great concern that we do not seem to be rearing the under-graduates in our universities, those to whom we must look for future leadership in missionary enterprises. The University youth of today are of one mind in the desire for a new world, and wish to make their own contribution. And we cannot wait until the war is over before making some definite approach to that problem," he said.

In his report to the Board of Management, the General Secretary of the M. S. C. C. said, "It is with a deep sense of gratitude that we are able to report an increase in the receipts of the General Assembly of \$19,391.27 over those of 1941 with an additional sum of \$81,459.33 for replacement of English grants. The increasing interest in the work of the Church has been manifested not only in relation to its missionary undertakings but throughout every branch of its work. This is as it should be and is most encouraging."

Total monies received by the M. S. C. C. during the calendar year of 1941 was \$763,383.97. The Women's Auxiliary also received, \$245,424.34.

Mexican Student Killed Four Girls

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 9 (AP)—Shooting men and women tried to murder Mexican City student today to avenge the slaying of four young women he garroted while diverting their attention with test tubes and books, and tonight police said his victims may actually number six or more.

The 27-year-old slayer, Gregorio Cardenas Hernandez, honor student in chemistry, already has confessed killing four women in less than a month, one of them his "only love." He said he kept her body for hours before burying it at dawn in a shallow grave in his garden.
