Ontario Protests Water Power Bill

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, March 8.—Members of the Ontario legislature met on Monday evening for the first time since their election without delay. They adopted a resolution, presented by Premier Howard Ferguson, urging the Dominion parliament not to enact a bill before the House of Commons which has for its purpose the repeal of a charter authorizing the Montreal, Ottawa and Georgian Bay Company, to construct a canal and develop water power rights of Ontario.

BARRIE'S FAMOUS STORY "PETER AND WENDY"

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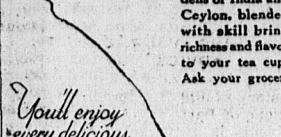

In explanation of what the nature of the revolution would have been, I may say a few words about Socialism. You are all aware that the miners' funds were largely augmented by Russian Soviet contributions, and that the miner's organizer, Mr. A. J. Cook, was a member of the Third International, the world executive of Socialism.

What is Socialism?

The word Soviet is the Russian for Council, and Socialism is a system adopted by the Russian Socialist Federal Republic where the localities are the unit of representation, or rather delegation. The system is thus described by Bukharin (in people's commissary) in a pamphlet published by the Workers' Socialist Federation: "The Central Government is established by the great class organization of the workers and peasants. The industrial unions, the factory committees, local workers' and peasants councils, and organizations of soldiers and sailors. From the center spread conducting threads, which lead to the provincial Soviets, the municipal Soviets, the local Soviets, and finally to the factory and workshop Soviets; The principle is familiar in industrial organizations, but Socialism is original in extending it to the political organization of the State. From this point of view the state may be regarded as an aggregation of Soviets! The constitution of the Russian Socialist Federal Republic as obtained by the Fifth All-Russian Congress of Soviets on July 10, 1918, declares that its fundamental aim is the suppression of all exploitation of man by man, and the bringing about of the Socialist organization of society in all respects. The supreme authority is theoretically vested in the All-Russian Congress of Soviets and in the interval of its session) in the Central Executive Committee. Congress is composed of representatives from urban Soviets and county Soviets. Congress is supposed to meet at least once a year, and it elects a central executive committee of not more than 200 members. The actual executive is confined to council of people's commissaries, consisting of heads of eighteen departments of state. Each commissary is responsible to the council of commissaries. Congress and executive committee appoint commissaries, who can be recalled either individually or collectively by the same authority. The local organization of the Soviets consists of congresses, the district congress, the district council of village congress. Right of election belongs to all citizens of the republic without distinction of sex, religion, nationality, or residential qualification, provided they are eighteen years of age and (a) earn their living by productive work; (b) are not members of the bourgeoisie; (c) are not members of the army or in navy; (d) are incapacitated, having worked as in (a) or (b). Excluded from voting are all who employ others for the sake of profits, who live on income derivable from interest on capital, industrial enterprises, landed property, etc.; private business men, agents, middlemen, monks and priests, members of the late ruling dynasty, police, etc., together with magistrates and criminals (for a prescribed time). Electors have the right at any time of recalling their elected delegates.

What We Escaped

You will see from this explanation what Great Britain narrowly escaped in that eventful twenty days of May, 1926. What would it have meant to us and to the other Dominions overseas? It would have entailed the breaking up of the Empire, and probably our absorption by the United States, for we would have been left practically unprotected by land and sea forces save what we could muster ourselves. It was a grave situation, indeed, and few of us realized it until all was over, and victory proclaimed on the pennons of British Constitutional Government. It is well we should ponder over these matters occasionally, for only by so doing are we in a position to appreciate the critical times in which we live and the fact that we have at the head of our great Empire an administrative body of wise heads in the three great parties steering us out of the shoals of revolutionary change which might have spelt ruin to us, as a commonwealth, if not as a British subject. But thanks be to God which giveth us the victory.

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
