SUPREME COURT.

There was no money for Mr Larkin in weighing and a great deal of responsibility. Every care was taken in the weighing, deduction was made for shrinkage, notice was given to fast the hogs, and his own observation was that they were well shrunken. There are only two witnesses as to the transaction at the factory before the hogs were bought. Mr Larkin's evidence is not weak in any particular and is not contradicted by any of his own witnesses. Mr Larkin is out of his money, without interest, for nearly a year and he has not even his commission. The principle running through all the cases decided in England and Canada is that the judgment upon the facts must be by the judgment of the jury and not the judgment of any other tribunal. The law and the constitution have confided to juries and not to judges the decision of the facts and if reasonable men might find the verdict no court has jurisdiction to disturb it and no court in England or in Canada would attempt to do so. Where there is a contradiction of evidence and the jury find one way their decision is final and it would be a usurpation of their power for any court to set aside their verdict. In this case it is wholly a question of credibility between Mr Larkin and Mr Wiley and the jury are absolute and final arbiters on the credibility of witnesses.

At the afternoon session of the Court Mr Stewart set a large number of cases in support of his contentions. The whole case, he said, was one of facts and these were alone for the jury to decide as has been laid down in decision after decision in the Supreme Court of Canada and in England setting aside motions for new trials.
Mr McKinnon quoted the law and contended that Mr Larkin had no authority to weigh the hogs. He was only to act as soliciting agent and the hogs were to be weighed by the weigher of the company. The hogs were weighed in Charlottetown. Mr Larkin told Mr Wiley to do the best he could about the weighing and it turned out there was 17 lbs deducted on each hog whether from an inaccuracy in the scales at Tignish or from shrinkage on the hogs. Mr Wiley allowed Mr Larkin 10 lbs and only charged him with 7 lbs. Mr Larkin accepted the cheque and thus endorsed the bargain. The verdict was thus contrary to the law Mr McKinnon contended (1) That no action could be taken because the plaintiff was not the authorized buying agent of the Company. (2) The defendant refused acceptance of the hogs until weighed by the Company's weigher. (3) Mr Larkin bought the hogs on his own account and made the best deal he could with the Company. Mr Larkin should have allowed the Company's buyer to re-weigh the hogs when he came to Tignish in the afternoon. The whole case hinges on the question whether Mr Larkin was the buying agent of the Company or not. The Company says that he was not.
Mr McKinnon was still speaking when court adjourned.

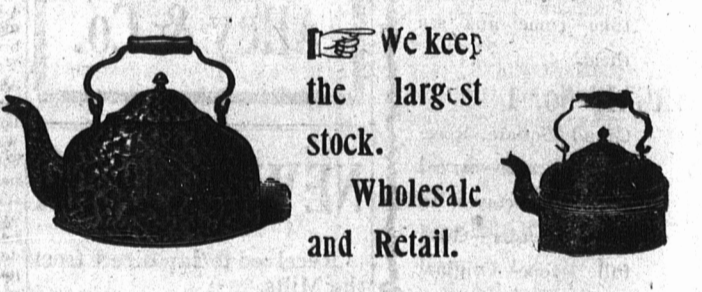
