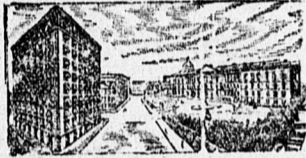

With ideal weather and roads for winter work, the farmers of Clyde River, have housed the best crop of ice that they have handled for years, twenty inches thick, and clear as glass. They have also about finished hauling their year's supply of firewood and now the chug, chug, of the gasoline engine is daily heard in the village, cutting the wood, much to the satisfaction of the poor horses.

A very interesting debate took place in the Prince of Wales College yesterday when the students presented arguments on the question whether a course for every student in Household Economy to be taught in that institution would be a benefit. This was carried in the affirmative by a vote of 19-18. The following were those arguing in favor of the resolution: Leo Neiligan, Miss Francis Steele, Eric Waberton, Miss Bertha Campbell, and those against it were Miss Lulu Ballem, John Nicholson, Miss Louise McCreedy and G. Green. Victor Saunders was recording secretary and Ambrose Paoli was critic.

W. S. Louison whose success and skill as an amateur photographer have been of great value to the Province, especially in bringing to notice the many points of beauty in Island scenery, has recently crossed to and from this Province to the mainland, both by the steamers and by the ice-boats at the Capes, taking many photographs by the way. These are of especial interest, and are down to date, showing actual present conditions. In them the "strap passengers" are shown, launching the boats, dragging them from the water again, and over the ice-fields. He also shows views of the Earl Grey and Minto in their heavy conflicts with the icebergs and ice fields. The proofs show to the Guardian are excellent, striking and life like. Mr. Louison's laudable object is now, as always to be sure better communication with the mainland in winter, and to draw the attention of people in other Provinces to our winter disabilities. To this end these splendid photos will be reproduced in the Montreal Standard, and it is hoped may yet be placed within the reach of citizens here who may desire to procure them in card form.

Louis McMillan, of P. E. Island, was interviewed on the train at St. John while on return to the west after a visit at his former home. He has been engaged in the ranching business and volunteered the statement that the trade agreement would be a great boon to the west and its introduction would result in a great increase of the popularity of the Laurier government. "No government which had the courage to grapple with this question and give to the west its greatest need, can be defeated," he said. "It will help the grain growers in that they will be able to get the latest American machinery at reduced prices, and at the same time command a bigger price for their wheat. Some of the machinery used in the west is not made in Canada, and there is no denying that the United States factories have their patents further advanced than in the Canadian goods. We are always glad to see anything from Britain as the strict regulations there guarantee a good article, but it is a long way off." Alfred Murphy, also on return after a visit to his P. E. Island home, said he could not grow faster how any country could grow faster than western Canada has done. No matter what changes were made in the tariff, he has been working in Calgary as a dairying contractor and was very strongly impressed with the businesslike way in which the affairs of the city were conducted. "They made \$34,000 a year out of their municipal street railway," he said, "and put the price of electric light and power away down. A Clyde River correspondent writes:—Our school has been closed on account of the measles which has been very prevalent here this winter. Our teachers has recovered sufficiently to open the school on Monday, March 5th. Our new Post Master, Kenneth Matheson, is getting his business in shape, by laying in a good supply of groceries for the Spring trade.—John Scott and sons, are doing a large amount of work, this winter, in their up-to-date mills. On the hum of the saws will be heard cutting up the large piles of logs and shingle wood collected at their mills.

Dr. James W. Robertson, Chairman of the Royal Commission on Technical Education and Industrial Training, who was here with that commission last year, recently delivered an address in Ottawa on Conservation. In the course of the address he referred as follows to an instance of conservation in P. E. I.: Then in Prince Edward Island a farmer from near Summerside testified. We asked his farmer how long he had been on the place he then held. Twenty-two years. He had 97 acres. Twenty years ago he had a mortgage of \$1,100 on the farm. For ten years he just held it over, keep cows and make butter. Here is conservation—land, cattle and the family. The previous year—1909—he had sold \$900 of butter and \$300 worth of pork, and he sold a horse every second year. There was no mortgage on his farm. That's conservation.

Writing to the Presbyterian Witness Church union on Feb. 25th, last, Mr. T. Fullerton, of St. James Church, City, says:—"In view of the large, and I think I am justified in saying, influential minority against the 'Basis of Union,' the time has come for the strong majority to play a magnanimous part by taking such action as will remove the question of union from some time from the active propaganda of the church. I submit that this is a fair suggestion, personally am strongly opposed to union but I appreciate and admire the sincerity of those in favor of the same. I feel that great and permanent good must accrue from the joint deliberations which have revealed the splendid ability and fine spirit. There is, however, grave danger in the existing conditions in forcing to an issue this far-reaching and important question by the power which has been legitimately placed in the hands of the majority as the result of the action of the church. I believe that such a generous act on the part of the majority would be highly appreciated by many in the church who look at the question from opposite stand-points, especially accompanied by some steps leading to federation."

**PROMOTES FRIENDSHIP BETWEEN G. B. U. S. AND FRANCE**

PARIS, March 4.—M. Picheon, foreign minister in the late cabinet of M. Briand, responding to a toast at a luncheon given today in his honor by the British and American correspondents, referred to the community of good will between Great Britain, France and the United States. "During my long and difficult years as foreign minister," he said, "I have constantly endeavored to solidify the friendship between France, the United States and Great Britain. I am not entitled to any great credit in doing this, because how could I have been blind enough to act otherwise. There exists between England, France and the United States so marked an identity of aspirations and solidarity of interests that it would be chimerical to seek to separate these grand peoples, who aim at common liberty, social progress, democracy and the maintenance of peace throughout the world."

M. Picheon, in concluding, affirmed that his successor would continue to strengthen the friendship of these three nations. The luncheon was arranged while M. Picheon was foreign minister in appreciation of his invaluable recognition of the place American and English newspapers have in the advancement in international good will.

**GREAT PROGRESS OF CANADIAN NORTHERN**

TORONTO, March 6.—The Canadian Northern Railway has so far this year placed orders for 95,000 tons of steel rails for delivery this year. These will cost above \$3,000,000. A great proportion of the rails came from Sydney, C. B. These will be laid in Ontario and the prairie provinces.

Last season 548 miles of steel were laid in Manitoba, Alberta and Saskatchewan. Grading for 520 miles of rails more in these provinces has been completed, and this work will be continued this coming summer. The first shipment of rails for the British Columbia section reached Port Mann yesterday.
