The Ottawa Evening Journal says:—Maritime province advantages in the way of summer resorts have become recognized rapidly of late. There had been a notable growth of tourists custom from the upper Canadian provinces and the United States. Prince Edward Island appears to be sharing very largely in summer attention, and most deservedly. The climate, the beaches and seabathing, fertility and scenery are all of the best. Canadians who are in the habit of going to sea-side resorts, or who think of beginning to do so should make enquire about the Island. The chances are that they will find it to possess all they can get at any foreign resort and it is our own country.

The Ottawa Citizen of 10th says:—When the statement is made officially as it was yesterday at the census bureau that complete returns of the enumerations have been received from only one province, Prince Edward Island, it will be seen to what extent the published reports of the population are based on guesswork rather than fact. Mr. Archibald Blue, special commissioner of the census, on being asked whether the newspaper statement, which places the population at 5,400,000 approximately, were correct, replied with an emphatic shake of the head. "It is all guesswork and is evidently far astray." This remark of Mr. Blue's covered also the figures given to indicate a stuffing of the census in 1891, namely that "54 of the constituencies (including part of the city of Toronto) show an increase of only 13,000 in population yet the number of families is larger by about 13,000 than the number reported in last census." It has for some time been stated that what the census returns indicate is that 54 counties of Ontario show a decrease of 10,000 in population, but an increase of 13,000 families, as compared with 1891. Mr. Blue declined to express any opinion upon the correctness of this statement, but it is learned from other sources that it is upon this alleged showing that the semi-official accusations of census stuffing in 1891 were based. However, such a deduction is open to question and there should be no difficulty in testing the accuracy of the 1891 returns in this respect.

Mr. J. D. S. ... returned to the city after having spent an enjoyable time at the Summer School of Science. He says:—Excursions have been had in the past. Excursions may be in the future but of one thing Summer School of Science students never have had the equal to that given them by the citizens of Bridgewater on Wednesday last, nor need they feel very disappointed if in the future they may not have another just quite as good. Everything that could be thought of to make the excursion enjoyable and give the visiting scientists an opportunity to see the places of interest historically and naturally, was done. The sail up the beautiful La Have River—the drive in and about Bridgewater—the lunch on the beautiful Des Brisay grounds—the return trip by the Central Railway were all provided by the citizens of Lunenburg, led in their hospitality by the Mayor of the town Mr. Davidson. Why said one and another "they could not have done more, if they were entertaining the Governor General" and certainly in the way of providing refreshments and conveyance not nearly so much would have been required to entertain Their Excellencies. The cost to the people of the entertainment furnished would have to be counted by dollars in the hundreds. Thursday evening's meeting was the last public meeting of the session. Dr. Andrews delivered his celebrated lecture on "A Speck of Life or the only Thing in the World that Lives." I have arranged with the doctor to deliver this lecture in Charlottetown next September. An opportunity will then be given to the citizens to enjoy a highly scientific lecture treated in an intensely popular style of interest to all, whether scientists or not. Following the lecture came a vote of thanks to the Mayor, Mr. Carroll, School Board, Trustees and Choir of the Methodist Church, Railways and Steamboats, Press, citizens of Bridgewater, retiring officers etc. These brought out responses that somewhat prolonged the meeting, but all enjoyed the exercises. Friday was examination day. A larger number than usual took the examination; that was to be expected as the school was much larger than usual. On the evening of the same day the round of festivities was brought to a close by a Garden Party on Kaulback's Head, a beautiful park owned by Hon. Mr. Kaulback, M. P. for Lunenburg.
