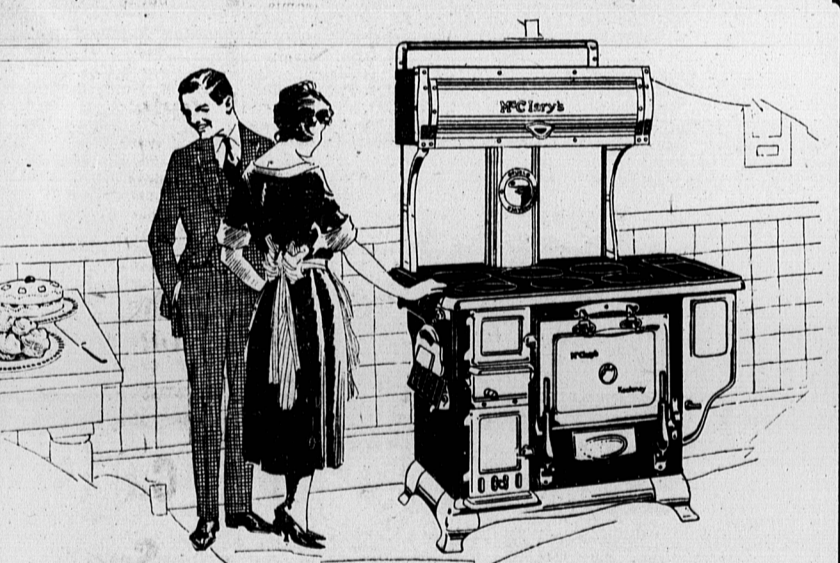

**LIBERAL PARTY AND TAXATION AND SUBSIDIES**

Sir,—Your Editorial in Monday's Guardian is well worth the careful consideration of every elector.

To put it shortly you have shown that every time a Liberal Government needed increased revenue they imposed direct taxation and that when Conservative Governments needed more money they got it from Ottawa.

J. C. Pope got the better terms after Laird had announced that it was no use to go back to Ottawa.

When Farquharson went to Ottawa looking for additional subsidy he was met by a leading provincial representative member of the Federal House and told to go home.

In 1907 the Liberal Government here accepted a settlement that was inadequate and they allowed the door to be closed on our claims.

Sir Wilfred Laurier in introducing the settlement in the House of Commons, March 26th, 1917, said: "Our object was to find a plan which would permanently set these matters at rest and place them on a basis different from that on which they had stood in the past."

The plan we proposed to them was that we should revise the subsidies given the Provinces with the clear intimation to them that no further claim would be recognized, that each Province must carry on its affairs with the means at its command, and must not have recourse to this Parliament. We thought we could not do better than have a friendly conference with the Provinces and ascertain what was the most they deemed requisite in order to prevent them coming again to Ottawa and knocking at the door of this Parliament.

Mr. Bergeron: "Will they not come again?"

Sir Wilfred Laurier: "I do not know, but if they come again we assume that my hon. friend will not listen to them, and if he will not, I certainly shall not, as far as I am concerned."

From this it can be seen that so far as the Liberal party in the Province was concerned there was no further hope of obtaining anything from Ottawa.

**REV. DR. THOMAS CORRECTED**

Sir,—It seems to me that the Rev. Dr. Thomas in one of the very few prohibitionists who have attempted to present a case which is reasonable men and women can support. Yet he is beside the mark when he suggests that the Provincial Government proposes to open liquor stores in all parts of the country. "What right," he asked, "had the Government of this province to open promiscuously all over the country that which is a menace to society?" The answer to that question is that the Government of this Province has proposed to do such things. On the contrary, the Government states emphatically "that no liquor stores will be opened outside the places where they are now open"—except after a majority vote of the municipality, township, or other large unit of population within which a store is proposed to be open, upon a plebiscite for that purpose, and upon a petition to the Lieutenant Governor in council signed by a representative number of electors residing in such municipality or township. Is there any suggestion in that statement of the Government that liquor stores will be promiscuously opened? On the contrary, there is

Let me call attention to a few of the many clauses, Section 162 plainly states that this Act is intended to prohibit, and SHALL prohibit, all transactions in liquor within Prince Edward Island. Has it ever done so, or ever made the slightest pretence of doing so? Could it possibly ever do so in the face of some of its wonderful provisions? The Prohibition Act is somewhat like the Psalmist said of himself, "He was fearfully and wonderfully made."

Allow me to call attention to one or two sections. Section 47, subsection (1) says any practising physician may give a patient a prescription to get 24 ounces of liquor each 24 hours: in the words of the Act he may give not more than one prescription to anyone patient, in any one day, and such prescription may not exceed 24 ounces (1½ pint) at one time and then the prescription must be written on a form supplied by the Board of Commissioners appointed under the Prohibition Act, making it a distinct Government sale of liquor. That is to say, every physician can give, according to this Act, a scrip for one and a half pints of 40 to 60 overproof rum every day and still keep within the law, and the patient can thus legally procure and consume 1½ pints of 40 overproof rum each day and still pose as a true blue prohibition man. How long could a man keep up that practise before becoming a sot, a common drunkard, subject to be arrested, taken before the magis-
