

Francis M Peters Invested Knight Of St. Gregory

(Ottawa Journal, Feb. 9th) Archbishop Vachon presided last night at a colorful ecclesiastical ceremony when St. George's Church was filled for the investiture of Francis M. Peters as a Knight of St. Gregory. Mr. Peters is deputy chief of the Public Debt Division of the Bank of Canada.

In a brief address Archbishop Vachon paid tribute to Mr. Peters' work in the task of financing the Marian Congress. A "gigantic spiritual undertaking," the congress required much planning involving material and financial considerations of great importance. In this task Mr. Peters had given full-time service.

Until recently Mr. Peters had been vice-president of the Holy Name Society.

His busy life in state affairs was recognized in 1937 when he received a medal from the King for outstanding service to Canada.

A member of the Catholic Truth Society, Mr. Peters had played a pioneer part in the Diocesan Council of Catholic Action, being particularly active in establishment of parish councils and credit unions.

His work as vice-president and treasurer of the parish conference of the St. Vincent de Paul Society has been outstanding. As trustee and chairman in 1935 of the School Board, Mr. Peters had played a prominent part in the efforts which culminated in building

the new school in 1936. Archbishop Vachon was assisted at benediction by Rev. Joseph Welch as deacon and Rev. John Beahan as sub-deacon. In the sanctuary were Rev. A. Archambault, secretary to Archbishop Vachon, Rev. Frank French, Rev.

The investiture was followed by a dinner at Villa Madonna in the presence of Archbishop Vachon where Mr. Peters was guest of honor.

In Memoriam

She was one of the oldest residents of Central Bedque, having reached the ripe old age of eighty-two years.

Although she had been able to go out but little during recent years, she kept remarkably active and her interests were many. She had long been a member of the United Baptist Church, also a life-member of the Women's Missionary Society.

Her husband, who predeceased her many years ago, had been an honored deacon.

The funeral, after a short service at the home, was held in the Central Bedque United Baptist Church. Interment was made in the family plot in the Baptist cemetery. There were many floral tributes. The service was conducted by her pastor, Rev. C.A. Britten. The hymns sung by request were "Does Jesus Care", "Safe In The Arms of Jesus", and "Abide With Me."

Mrs. Leard was most highly regarded by a large number of people, and will be long remembered with sincere affection, not only by her many relatives, but also by very many friends in the surrounding country.

Increase Suggested In Hog Population

That the Province should have a swine population of approximately 150,000 head was recommended in the Livestock Committee's report at the Agricultural Conference here last week.

This would result from an average production of 15 marketable hogs per year on 10,000 farms in the province. The present production is about 100,000.

To reach the desired hog population special emphasis should be placed on farms where hogs are not produced now to any great extent especially in the area west of Lot 16 in Prince County.

The committee suggested that the desired hog production would require approximately 275 bushels of mixed grain per farm plus protein supplement to finish the hogs. The grain, it was suggested, could be grown on from six to seven acres.

The growing of an acre of rape for hogs would "lower the producer's cost of production at least one-third on those hogs fed during the summer period." Also recommended was the growing of one-half acre to an acre of mangels for winter feeding.

It was recommended as a long term policy that all commercial hog producers here use a sow from Advanced Registry stock. And a recommendation was made to the Directors of the Provincial Exhibition Association and the Amherst Winter Fair that no sow over two years of age that has not qualified in Advanced Registry be

permitted to show. (This would mean a sow that had had at least three litters which would give ample time, the committee felt, for her to qualify if she was the right type of animal.)

Also recommended was a larger test station for Advanced Registry and that the Experimental Farm be urged to do more experimental work with hogs.

The belief in the effectiveness of Advanced Registry was still in evidence when the committee recommended that all boars born after December 1st, 1947, must be from qualified dams before a bonus will be paid under the Provincial Board Bonus policy.

A further suggestion for the improvement of the industry and for the benefit of those engaged in it was that inoculation for swine erysipelas and hemorrhage septicaemia be given by the Provincial Government until adequate veterinary service are available on an export stock at a reasonable charge.

The use of turpentine, naphtha gas and linseed oil was recommended for parasite control in hogs providing that the treatment is repeated in 12 to 14 days.

The present estimated hog population of 100,000 was made up as follows:

65,000 slaughtered through packing plants.

18,000 slaughtered and used on farms. 5,000 slaughtered and used in villages.

10,000 sucker pigs shipped to Newfoundland.

2,000 sucker pigs shipped to Nova Scotia.
