

CUT THIS OUT AND PASTE IT UP

Almost every day The Guardian receives orders by mail to insert news matter of an advertising nature. In most of these cases the senders, who are frequently not known to any member of the staff and who have no account in the advertising department, write "Please insert the following and oblige," thus apparently implying that they think the items will be inserted free. Only a few weeks ago a reader wrote asking that his advertisement of Farm for Sale be inserted free from day to day until he cancelled it, as he is a subscriber to The Guardian. In this connection it may be said that the subscription price is not sufficient to even pay the actual cost of paper, ink, presswork, mailing, bookkeeping and other expenses of the circulation department proper, and thus subscribers have no privileges of free advertising and are on the same footing as non-subscribers. Seldom ever does the sender state whether the item is to appear in the Morning Daily or the Rural Daily, whether for one or more times in either Daily, or in both, whether as a display advertisement, announcement, business local, classified ad or otherwise. When for church or charitable purposes they seldom ever say so, or do not enclose sufficient money to pay for same all of which will be returned by first mail in the event of the item not being chargeable, or if more money is sent than necessary to pay for the item the surplus will be returned at once, there being a greater discount for cash with order for advertising of churches & other for regular business. In all such cases the Advertising department communicates with the sender as quickly as possible by mail or phone, often paying the messenger service to get them to the telephone if not too far

Owing to yesterday being the King's Birthday and a statutory holiday the regular monthly meeting of the Charlottetown Council was adjourned last night until the usual hour tonight. The usual levying of assessment and the passing of the estimates will engage the attention of the City Fathers tonight.

KINGSTON, Ont., June 2—Eight men killed, and sixteen in the General Hospital, seriously injured, is the recent awful toll of an accident which occurred in a construction camp of the Canadian Northern Railway six miles east of Stones Corners, Perth Road, twenty-five miles from Kingston at 4.43 o'clock on Saturday afternoon. The men were working in a rock cut and met death as a result of a premature explosion of black powder used to blast the rock. Of the eight men killed all were with one exception, Roumanians. Prescott Northrup, aged 25, walking east, for the two miles road in the vicinity where the accident occurred, was a New Brunswick man. Northrup was engaged in setting off a blast and his body was blown to pieces. He has been engaged in the construction work all his summer.

BRITAIN IS READY.

MALTA, June 1—The conference to decide Great Britain's future policy in the Mediterranean which began here May 29, was concluded today. Among those who participated were Premier Asquith, Winston Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, Viscount Kitchener and General Ian Hamilton.

MCDONALD—in Charlottetown, June 2, 1912, James McDonald, aged 68 years, formerly of Rustico. The remains will be forwarded to Rustico this morning for interment.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 1—Mrs. Jessie C. Barnes shot and killed Mrs. W. W. Judd, last night at Buffalo Valley, Tenn., as the result of a quarrel. The dead woman is charged with having paid to Mrs. Barnes' husband.

The shooting took place on the platform of a passenger car in a train which arrived at Buffalo Valley from Nashville.

Mrs. Barnes boarded the train at the station a few miles from Buffalo Valley. She walked to the car platform where her victim was standing and calmly fired three bullets into her body. Mrs. Barnes left the train with much composure and was arrested a short time later.

Mr. Barnes was in Nashville at the time of the shooting. Barnes formerly was a distiller and is a prominent land owner in Putnam County. He and his wife reside at Cavefort, Tenn. He married Mrs. Barnes four years ago at Evansville, Ind.

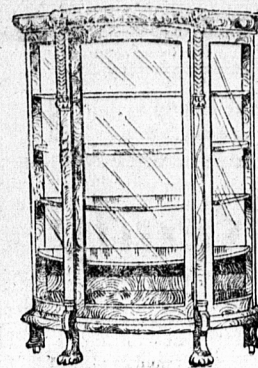

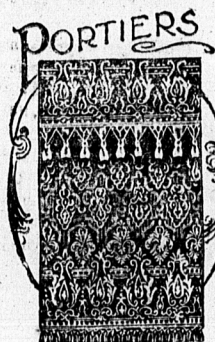

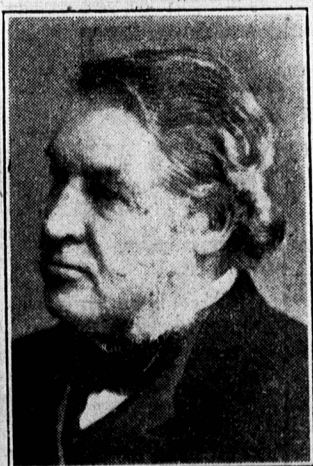
