SPEAKING to the Halifax Herald, John Moore, Crapaud, who is attending the Agricultural School at Truro said that the Island farmers had been given definite instructions in regard to breeding to type in all the principal breeds of domestic animals, to select the varieties of seed, to prepare the land, to sow at the best time in the season to obtain the most satisfactory results. The courses, Mr. Moore said, are particularly beneficial to the farmer who has a pretty good general knowledge of the origin of soils, and of the necessity of the maintenance of the fertility of the farms, but who is working somewhat in the dark. The results of experiments in various lines are illustrated by examples of almost incalculable advantage even though the course may be thought to be somewhat short.
