—GOOD WORK.—Mr. Frances Peters of Hunter River has recently been engaged as teacher at Tignish Shore. This being his first experience in the teaching profession it is hard to gauge his merits but he seems to possess considerable energy, and to be very much interested in his work. Besides conducting the ordinary classes he has established a night school for the men of the district. It meets three times a week and the large

number in attendance show very emphatically that these men realize the want of education. It is rather unique to see these men, some of them at least forty years of age, studying the elements of arithmetic and grammar, but it should impress a valuable lesson on those indifferent parents who seem to think that education is somewhat of a luxury and that it can easily be disposed with in the ordinary work on the farm etc. Practically all those who attend this school are fishermen, but they seem to realize the fact that a little education is indispensable even in fishing lobsters. Mr. Peters is therefore deserving of praise and his efforts in this respect are worthy of imitation by other teachers who are in a position to assist those who from lack of facilities were unable to obtain the rudiments in their youth. —T.

—SUPERINTENDENT CAMPBELL AT KINKORA.—On Friday the 30th ult., the Chief Superintendent of Education accompanied by Inspector Boulter visited Kinkora School. Thirty-one visitors were present to note the progress being made by the children of the district, who were subjected to a most rigid examination. IN MEMORIAM

MRS. THOMAS JENKINS

Entered into eternal rest on January 25th, 1914, at Peter's Road, Lot 63, after a short illness, born with true christian resignation Sarah Gray Jenkins relict of the late Thomas Jenkins in the 86th year of her age. Mrs. Jenkins living to such an advanced age, experienced in her lifetime, many changes incident to the few who attain this majority of years. Settling with her husband on a farm in the early pioneer days — they bravely toiled side by side, encountering the difficulties of that primitive time, and by dint of strength succeeded in building up a happy home, where a family of six sons and six daughters were raised, all of whom but one daughter survive, and were able to be present to the last with the exception of William of Worcester, Mass. and Mrs. Falkenberg of Jonesport, Me. During her illness she departed had the unceasing and skillful attendance of her daughter, Mrs. W. A. Robertson of Worcester, Mass. It is worthy of note that Mrs. Jenkins had the unique distinction of being the progenitor of five generations, being at the time of her death a great-grandmother. Among the many good qualities possessed by the departed, we might mention that of charity, seldom has the writer known one who so befriended the needy. Her home was even open to those who were friendless, or in want, and many can attest to her sterling gen-

erosity in this respect. The deceased up to the time of her death maintained a vigorous intellect, was well informed on all matters of the day, and it was a pleasure to converse with her. But the chief subject which she loved to dwell upon and read was her "Bible". Here she found the hidden spring of all her comforts and joys. Here she read of that happy Home to which, she by the blessed work of Christ, was assured of a blessed entrance. This it was that during her illness, a quiet calm and trust possessed her soul, and she looked longingly forward to that blessed moment, when she would enter into the joys of her Saviour. The funeral services were conducted by her pastor, Rev. Ewen MacDougall, who spoke most fittingly and impressively from the text: For we know that if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, a house not made with hands eternal in the Heavens.—Zool. 5-1.
