Canadian Battlefields Memorials Commission

1. The Commission desires to appoint eight designers in connection with the project to erect eight monuments on selected battlefields sites in France and Belgium.

2. With this object a competition will be held which is open to all Architects, Sculptors, or other Artists in Canada.

3. The competition is organized in two stages. The prizes in the first stage consist of invitations limited to twenty (20) in number to compete in the second stage; an honorarium of \$500 being paid to those selected for invitation. The prizes in the second competition are the commissions to carry out the work.

4. The cost of each monument is estimated at one hundred and twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000.00).

5. The Assessors in the competition will be: Mr. Frank Darling, F.R.I.B.A., R.C.A., representing the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada.

6. Mr. Perry E. Nobbs, F.R.I.B.A., R.C.A., will act as Architectural Adviser.

7. Copies of the Conditions will be sent to the Royal Canadian Academy and the architectural bodies for distribution among members. Copies may also be had on application to:

Colonel H. C. Osborne, Honorary Secretary, Canadian Battlefields Memorials Commission, Militia Department, Ottawa, Ont.

8. Applications should be accompanied by a deposit of \$5 which will be returned to those submitting designs in the preliminary competition.
