CLOUDBURST IN ALBERTA DROWNS TWO

Mad Waters Sweep Dwelling From Its Foundation And Carry Occupants To Undetermined Fate.

DRUMHELLER, Alta., June 17—A mother and her son were carried away to an undetermined fate last night when a mighty cloudburst broke down on the mining town of Wayne in southern Alberta. Roads were ruined, basements filled with water and a mine flooded by the sudden downpour, believed to be the worst in Alberta's history.

Mrs. James Graham and her 12 year old son were carried away when their little dwelling was swept from its foundations. Searchers today had found no trace of the frame house and sought to ascertain whether it had been crushed into the water filled excelsior mine or carried away on the swollen waters of Rosebud Creek. No hope is held for the lives of its two occupants.

Pouring out of the dark skies in tremendous volume, water swept down the Excelsior Hill and picked up the little home of James Graham. The mad waters, before sweeping the dwelling from its foundation tore through the Excelsior Mine and caused a wide section of a roadway leading to an entrance of the mine to cave in.

Water entered the mine and rushed along the roadway a short distance before pouring into Rosebud Creek. As far as could be learned no one saw the house disappear. Marks where the dwelling had stood were found by those reaching the scene as soon as the heavy downpour slackened. Immediately inquiries were made in the district and Mr. Graham was located. He said he had left his wife and son in the house only a short time before.

"Washington First" Policy Of Mr. King Scored By Dr. Manion

Liberal Leader's "Fine Frenzy" Analyzed In Parliament By Minister Of Railways. Budget Debate Livens Up.

OTTAWA, Ont., June 17—From the Conservative benches this afternoon, Hon. R. J. Manion, Minister of Railways and Canals, resuming the budget debate, commented on the "fine frenzy of righteous indignation into which the Opposition leader worked himself yesterday over the alleged neglect of the unemployed."
The declarations of Mr. King, he continued, "reminded us of those days in 1920. The Government may have made some mistakes; but at the same time it remained a "Canada first" Government. The Government of Mr. Mackenzie King, he said, had taken more money from the people of Canada in taxation "during his years of Premiership than any other Government in the history of this country." Mr. King had spoken yesterday of millions. But the opposition leader evidently had forgotten or overlooked his former associations, his association with a millionaire who was one of the "greatest exploiters

BUSINESS IS READJUSTING ITSELF

Much enthusiasm was shown at the second annual meeting of the P. E. Island Mink Breeders' Association held in the Curling Rink, Summerside, last night. Mr. J. R. Forbes, president and opened the meeting by expressing his pleasure to see so many members present and the continued interest shown in the business. The Secretary then read the minutes of the previous meeting and financial statement for this year, which were read and approved. The Secretary reported as follows: This organization is accountable for much of the protection which the mink industry of P. E. Island has been justly accorded. We were the first of the nine provinces to organize the association and now nearly all the other provinces have their mink associations. We have been able to meet all our liabilities and show a credit balance. This association through its publicity has become widely known and numerous inquiries from Europe has reached us by letter and cable in regard to our mink. Negotiations have been limited through the general economic condition prevailing today. However, the day of adjustment and normal restoration appears on the horizon and an opportune time for mink breeders to prepare for next year's market. It is urgent that we ranch only the best and cull out all mink that cannot be classed under dark or extra dark shades. Mink breeding is only in its infancy, but much may be expected from persistent attention. Through careful breeding, it is possible to obtain superior mink. In constructing a minkery, ventilation, sanitation and suitable rations, location and cost of material must be taken into consideration. A balanced ration is economically produced by incorporating milk or vegetable in a mash with a cereal base and containing meat and fish. In consideration of present conditions the directors recommend economical management by the association in particular, and mink breeders in general. AL CAPONE FACES THIRTY-FOUR YEARS

CHICAGO, Ill., June 17—Scarface Al Capone will reappear in the Federal Court of Federal Judge James H. Wilkerson on June 30 to be sentenced to prison and to abdicate his rule of what once was the most powerful gang of wholesale murderers, bombers, torturers, labor racketeers, illicit brewers, gamblers and vice mongers the United States has ever known. "Scarface Al" has before him a maximum term of 34 years and a top fine of \$50,000. Because of his guilty plea he hopes for a prison sojourn of considerable less than that and a fine not quite so stiff.

MR. KING WAILS AT LENGTH AGAINST GOVT.

Liberal Leader Condemns Everything Premier Has Done—Peeved When Mr. Bennett Laughs At His Vagaries.

OTTAWA, June 17—When Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King, Liberal leader, rose to speak in the budget debate in the Commons yesterday, he was greeted with prolonged applause from his followers. The present budget, he said, was of exceptional interest for two or three reasons. In the first place, it was presented while all countries, including Canada, were in the midst of economic depression and while considerable social unrest was abroad. The budget also reflected the policies and the spirit of the present administration. Thirdly, for the first time in Canadian history, the budget was presented by a cabinet minister who held the dual office of Prime Minister and Minister of Finance.

Perhaps, Mr. King suggested with a trace of humor in his voice, Premier Bennett would relish a change in Canada whereby the office of Minister of Finance would be changed to Chancellor of the Exchequer. This would be in keeping with the traditions of Great Britain. Mr. King, personally would have no objections to such a change.

It was necessary for the Liberal leader to go back to the year 1880 to find a precedent for a Prime Minister presenting a budget as Minister of Finance. Rt. Hon. William Ewart Gladstone at that time held the dual office. This was a "noble example for him (Mr. Bennett) to follow but I wish he had presented a budget more along the lines of Mr. Gladstone."

The British Liberal leader, however, had not assumed the dual role of Prime Minister and Chancellor of the Exchequer, without 48 years of public service behind him, proceeded Mr. King.

Mink Breeders Hold Meeting At Summerside

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Return To Old Conditions Perhaps Not Desirable, Says Mr. C. C. Ferguson, General Manager of Great West Life.

"There is evidence of business readjusting itself to the new condition of affairs," stated Mr. C. C.
