THE ARANMORE HERE.—The C. G. S. Aranmore arrived in Charlottetown from Sable Island on Tuesday evening. She is now taking on board supplies preparatory to proceeding up the Strait on light-house supply work. The Aranmore went to Sable Island to take off the crew of the wrecked steamer Galatea, a ship of about 3,000 tons which recently ran ashore there. The Galatea is high and dry but is evidently not greatly injured. The crew decided to stand by the ship. The Captain left the island by the Aranmore and landed at Port Hawkesbury. The Aranmore was formerly in the Plant Line service between Charlottetown-Halifax and Boston.
