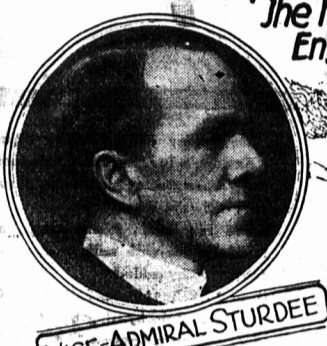

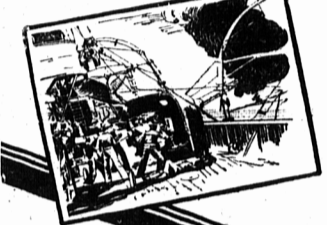

Last evening at the C. A. A. grounds, the fast travelling Moncton C. C.'s, this year the champions of the Moncton City League and in the running for the Maritime title, were held to a score of 0-0 by the Abegweits.

The game last night surpassed any seen on the local diamond this year as both teams played heads-up ball all through, with only six errors credited to the two teams; two for the Abegweits and four for the visitors.

BILL SHARON BACK AGAIN

Famous Horse Arrived in Charlottetown Last Evening

Bill Sharon, 2.04-1, now owned by Dr. D. H. McAllister of Sussex, N. B., arrived in Charlottetown last evening accompanied by Caretaker Finnegan and Driver Fred Cameron. "Bill Sharon" is one of the most famous horses on the American continent. A few years back Islanders will remember his performance here when he established the present track record for trotting of 2:11-4. That fall after leaving here, he met a bunch of good free-for-all pacers at Woodstock, N. B. and defeated them so easily that he was sold to Thomas W. Murphy of New York by his owner Herbert Alchorn for \$25,000, the largest sum ever paid for a trotter or a pacer in Canada. With Murphy he became so cross that he was almost impossible to manage, but in the races he started, he showed remarkable speed taking the record of 2:04-1 on a mile track.

Murphy didn't like his kicking ways so sent him to the auction. When he was led to the auctioneer's box, the first bid was \$600, Bill evidently thought this was a reflection on his quality so promptly kicked the box to smithereens. At last J. J. Roberts of Worcester, Mass., had the courage to buy him and he was placed in the hands of trainer Harry Brusie, who won a big string of victories with him on the half-mile tracks. Two years ago he went wrong behind, and was acquired by the present owner who treated the ailing limbs and got him perfectly sound again. This year in the hands of Trainer Fred Cameron he has been making a remarkable comeback on the Maine and New Brunswick circuit, defeating the best of the fast class trotters.

Bill is looking wonderful, big, strong, fat with a beautiful glossy coat. The "danger sign" occupies a place on his door, warning sight-seers to keep clear as Bill is liable to take a bite out of one too familiar or give a sly kick if you come too close.

ONT. GOLFERS WIN TROPHY

Maritime Players Have Aggregate Gross of 773 for Four-Man 36-Hole Competition in Match at Montreal

MONTREAL, Aug. 13. — Ontario golfers with an aggregate low gross of 621 for the 36 hole competition carried off the four-man interprovincial team match contested at the Royal Montreal Golf Club course Saturday and as a result received the Willingdon Cup from the hands of the donor, His Excellency Viscount Willingdon.

Brilliant golf by Jack Cameron of Ottawa; F. G. Hoblitzel of Toronto, Ross Somerville, London, Ont., and two steady rounds by the veteran R. M. Gray, brought the honors to the Ontario team. They led Quebec by 14 strokes in the morning round and added 10 more strokes to their lead on the final 18 holes, finishing with a decisive margin of 24 strokes.

The defenders, the Quebec representatives, failed to retain the title won last year at Hamilton when despite an improvement in their golf on the second 18 holes they were unable to match the 74, 75 and 76 turned in by Hoblitzel, Cameron and Somerville for Ontario, and were second with 645.

Manitoba, one stroke behind Alberta at the end of the morning round, through a smart 74 by A. Weir and a 77 by Carson MacWilliams, on the second 18 holes, finished in third position, with an aggregate of 659.

MARITIMES LAST

Alberta was fourth with 671, the youthful golfers from the far west improving their scores in the afternoon to retain their slim lead over Manitoba in the third place fight. However, Alberta introduced to the gallery two players who made a distinct impression and of whom more is expected to be heard in the future, J. A. M. Mountfield and Gordon MacWilliams attracting much favorable notice by their play. In this they shared some of the glory with D. Kennedy, of the Manitoba team, a finished young golfer who shot a steady game today.
