

The Markets

MONTREAL, May 28.—There was no further change in the local egg situation yesterday, but the undertone to the market continues east on account of the liberal supplies coming forward of which on account of the warmer weather prevailing the quality is not so good. A fair trade continues to be done for domestic account, but there is little demand for supplies from outside sources as yet, in fact, up to the present no sales have been reported for export. The receipts were 4,740 cases, as against 2,688 for the same day last week and 2,243 for the corresponding day a year ago.

We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows: Selected eggs 35c to 34c Straight candled 31c to 32a No. 1 stock 29c to 30c No. 2 stock 26c to 27c The trade in the maple product is falling off some owing to the advanced season, and the decreased consumption, consequently the market was quiet, but as supplies are not large the tone of the market remains steady and prices are unchanged with sales of odd small lots of maple syrup at \$2.10 to \$2.25 per tin of one gallon, and light maple sugar at 22c, and 23c per lb., and dark at 20c, and 21c.

The demand for car lots of potatoes shows no improvement and the market continues quiet with prices for Green Mountains quoted at 75c to 80c per bag, and Quebec stock at 65c to 70c per bag of 90 lbs. extract. The demand in a wholesale jobbing way continues fair and prices are unchanged at 85c to 90c per bag of 80 lbs. extract.

New York, May 26.—Eggs firm. Receipts 26,326 cases. Fresh gathered extras firsts 25½c to 27¼c; firsts 24c to 26c; State, Pennsylvania and nearby western hennery whites, firsts to extras, 29c to 36c State, Pennsylvania and nearby western hennery, extras, 32c to 33c do. gathered browns and mixed colors, firsts to extras, 24c to 29c; Storage packed, extra firsts 28c to 28½c; do. firsts 26½c to 27½c.

A feature of the local egg situation yesterday was the weaker feeling that developed in the market for the lower grades and prices for No. 1 and No. 2 stock declined 1c to 3c per dozen, which was attributed to the accumulation of stocks of such and somewhat limited demand, but, on the other hand, the price of the market for the higher grades was steady and prices were unchanged, with a good steady demand for supplies for immediate consumption, and a fairly active trade was done. The receipts were 2,688 cases, as against 2,850 for the same day last week and 3,859 for the corresponding day a year ago.

We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows: Selected eggs 34c to 35c Straight candled 30c to 32c No. 1 stock 29c to 30c No. 2 stock 26c to 27c Owing to the somewhat liberal supplies of maple syrup coming forward here and the steady demand for the same, a stronger feeling has developed in the market and prices have scored an advance of 10c to 15c per gallon, with sales in a wholesale jobbing way at \$2.10 to \$2.25 per tin of one gallon, but the market for maple sugar is unchanged, with a moderate demand for supplies of light colored stock at 22c to 23c per lb. and dark at 20c to 21c.

There was no change in the condition of the market for potatoes, business in car lots being still slow on account of the fact that buyers are fairly well supplied for the time being. Prices were unchanged, with Green Mountains quoted at 75c to 80c, and Quebec stock at 65c to 70c per bag of 90 lbs. extract, while in a jobbing way a fair trade was done at 85c to 90c per bag of 80 lbs. extract.
