OLAND'S BODY IS COMING HOME

Will Have Military Funeral—Arrest for Murder in Rochester—Railway Accident on Missouri Pacific Injures Fifty But None Were Killed.

OLAND'S BODY BROUGHT HOME.

PORTLAND, Dec. 4.—(Special.)—In the wreck of the Missouri Pacific express near Holden on Saturday afternoon about fifty passengers were injured but no one was killed.

SPAIN IN GRIP OF SNOW KING

MADRID, December 3.—The heaviest snowstorm experienced in Spain in many years, lasting nearly thirty hours, has compelled a partial cessation of business. In Madrid street traffic has been stopped, the stores are closed, the markets are without supplies and 200,000 workmen are without employment. The railways and telegraph lines are utterly disorganized and have sustained much damage. There have been numerous accidents. King Alfonso has ordered the barracks be kept open for the accommodation of sufferers. The Queen Mother Maria Christina and the mayor of Madrid have arranged for the release of all winter clothing of the poorer classes in the hands of pawn brokers. The authorities are taking all possible measure.

ICE-BREAKER REACHES QUEBEC

QUEBEC, December 4.—(Special.)—The ice breaker Montcalm, purchased from Scotland for service in the River St. Lawrence, arrived on Saturday. She is a splendid steamer 245 feet long, 23 beam, 1000 hold, is magnificently fitted up with two sets triple expansion engines, maximum horse power 3,000, but can develop speed of only 12 knots.

She will begin discharging just as soon as the Cacoma finishes discharging her cargo. MOTHER AND SON POISONED BY GAS

GALT, Ont., Dec. 4.—(Special.)—Mrs. Jas. Barber and her son George, not having been seen for some days, the neighbors broke into the house and found both dead.

The mother was on a bed and the son on the floor near by. The coroner said both had been dead fourteen days, death being caused by gas from the stove.

NEARLY POISONED BY HALL STOVE

A family living on Malpeque Road just outside the city limits were nearly victims of asphyxiation yesterday afternoon from a hall stove that they recently purchased. They did not thoroughly understand its working and the escaping gas during the night necessitated the calling in of a physician for almost the entire family yesterday.

THE ALLIANCE AT WORK.

TORONTO, Dec. 4.—(Special.)—The Dominion Alliance has appointed a campaign committee composed of prominent temperance leaders who will work out the campaign.

When possible temperance candidates will be placed in the field and when this is not advisable voters will be urged not to vote when the party candidate refuse to support a prohibition pledge.

Famous Vine in Royal Gardens.

While, in these days of widely diffused knowledge in relation to the production of grapes, many persons find it difficult to obtain well ripened clusters from comparatively young vines, it is extremely interesting to refer to a great vine planted 129 years ago and bearing a crop of some 1,000 bunches, the berries finely developed and as black as sloes.

This grand old vine is growing in the Cumberland Lodge portion of the royal gardens at Windsor, and is known as the Cumberland Lodge vine. It is one of the descendants of the famous vine at Hampton Court, which was planted 139 years ago, and it has outdistanced its venerable parent in dimensions, in vigor and in productiveness. Occupying a great glass structure 120 feet long by 20 feet wide, it spreads its luxuriant branches over a roof area of 2,400 feet, which is fully one-third greater than the area of the house occupied by its venerable parent at Hampton Court.

For so large a vine 1,000 bunches, weighing in the aggregate 1,500 lbs., is not a heavy crop, but the grapes are in every way befitting the royal table, and to overtax the strength of so old a vine would be unwise. Gardeners' Magazine.
